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Eder's Attorney Says Charge Not Established

The Agency for Sales T. Eder told the Birmingham Eccentric Wednesday that he "fails to see" that the prosecution has "established evidence that an all-embracing conspiracy has been committed."

Ivan E. Barris has been retained by Eder, 444 Bryn Mawr, Birmingham, to defend him against charges of criminal conspiracy in an alleged Detroit D&W graft racket.

Eder, a trucking contractor, was arrested July 11. His examination began Monday. Six other trucking company officials have been named in the case as well as 100 employees, past and present. Eder has pleaded not guilty to the charges.

FINDING, a former inductor for scaleman, was named a defendant in the conspiracy warrants but turned state's witness. He is now named only as a co-conspirator.

Sheatz, a D&W scaleman, also has been named a co-conspirator.

Commenting on the examination Barris said, "It may terminate Thursday or Friday of this week." A court official has said examination of all the co-defendants may go on for another two weeks.

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BARRIS TOLD, The Eccentric that two witnesses, Marvin Sheatz of Detroit, and Martin Findling of Oak Park, had indicated, from the prosecution's point of view, that Eder was involved in some conspiracy. Barris, however, said that credibility of witnesses is not established at an examination.

"However," he said, "it is a principle of law that the credibility of a co-conspirator is highly suspect."

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Fire Truck Needs Tow Job After Collision With Car

A West Bloomfield fire truck and a passenger car collided Monday, shortly before noon, in Bloomfield Hills at Kirkwood and Inwood Circle. No one was injured.

Driver of the car was Alvin W. Bass, 49, of 1576 Kirkway. The fire truck was driven by Fireman Carl F. Domes, 37, of Pontiac.

The fire truck was damaged along the left side, front and center, and was towed away from the scene. The front end of the car which Bass was driving was also badly damaged.

SASS SAID, his vision was obstructed by brush as he rounded the curve. The road was narrow and the pavement wet, police said. The fireman told police Sass had tried to stop.

After colliding with the truck, the car ricocheted 20 feet into a yard at 1567 Island Lane.

The truck was en route to this address to investigate a report of smoke in a garage.

Another fire truck, following the one driven by Domes, proceeded with the investigation after making sure there were no apparently-serious injuries from the accident.

"They found steam, but no fire in the garage."
