

### Roberts Seeks State Senate Re-election

PONTIAC — Sen. Farrell E. Roberts (R., Oakland County) yesterday announced he will seek re-election to his seat in the Michigan Senate.

Roberts, who had delayed his decision on running again, said his decision was based on "the character of the announced opposition."

"If I could be confident that a successor to my seat would be a person who could be relied upon to forcefully pursue responsible, conservative policies, I would gladly return to my law practice," Roberts said.

"Unfortunately, this has not been the case. The candidates who have announced thus far are running on platforms of 100 per cent negativism."

The 40-year-old Pontiac attorney, a member of the Dieterle, Roberts and Breck firm, declared that only he is the chief problem facing Republicans in the Aug. 7 primary.

"Republicans will win at all levels in November—if they stop squabbling and unite behind George Romney," Roberts stated.

"I think there's no question that Romney is slowly unfolding a responsible, conservative program that will appeal to Republicans, independents, and discerning Democrats," Roberts said.

### Roberts SCOFFED at the income tax as a local campaign issue

"The vultures will try to make capital of it and further their ambitions through emotional anti-income tax appeals. But the income tax isn't and never was an issue. The issues are jobs and the kind of tax revision that will help produce jobs and stimulate revenues," Roberts explained.

Roberts predicted that Michigan's tax will continue until the Michigan's economic growth rate catches up with our population expansion.

A graduate of the U. S. Naval Academy and the University of Michigan Law School, Roberts served as State Representative from Oakland County's 3rd district before his election to the Senate.

Roberts is chairman of the Senate Elections Committee, and is a member of the Judiciary and Retirement committees. He is a member of the Kiwanis Club, Amvets and Elks. As an attorney, he belongs to the Oakland County, Michigan and American Bar associations, plus the Judiciary Society.

## Try Experiment to Solve Eton St. Parking Problem

To alleviate a parking problem in the Eton-Buckingham-Pembroke area, Birmingham is changing the designation of Eton from "through" to a "local" street for a 36-day period.

City commissioners agreed to the experiment Monday night after a lengthy debate on the problem, its cause and possible solutions.

As a "through" street, Eton presently has no stop signs for state streets from Maple north to the Pembroke School.

But to change it to a "local" street, the police department will change the stop signs on Pembroke to "yield the right-of-way" signs. Parking will then be permitted on both sides of Eton.

THE PROBLEM arose after the police department began enforcement of an ordinance prohibiting parking between 2 and 6 a.m. on Eton.

Many residents of the various apartment buildings on the west side of Eton, unable to find off-street parking spaces, had been parking their cars all night on Eton.

With the new enforcement, they were thus forced to park on the side streets—Buckingham, Pembroke, Manchester, Dorchester and Windemere.

THIS BROUGHT complaints from residents on those streets. They cited the safety hazards posed for their children inasmuch as many cars were being parked on their streets day and night.

Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley pointed out that owners of the apartments, had met the zoning requirements of one parking space per family.

But it seems that the apartment dwellers are two- and three-car families, thus forcing many of them to find on-street parking space.

WHEN THE Graefield Terrace, located on Eton, was built in 1953 and 1954, the situation will be compounded. About 50 to 60 cars will be forced onto Eton.

JUST THREE WEEKS AGO Joe Haas, of nearby Holly, was beside his late beloved wife, Winifred. He had reached the age of 85. Almost up to the point he passed on he reported with his folky column, "Man About Town," in The Pontiac Press. During his many years on The Herald he was content to get out a quite small weekly, but he always maintained his editorial loyalty to the causes of good government, schools, churches, etc. After his sale of The Herald, he and his wife did much globe circling—and right up to her passing several years ago, she always accompanied Joe to press association meetings. Joe's devotion to his Winifred was an example and inspiration to all who met them.

nature trails along the banks of the Rouge River and in Miller Park and is continually developing and improving upon them.

those two nights, bringing the total to about 100 cars seeking on-street spaces.

Commissioner Robert Page, who resides on Manchester, insisted that the "basic problem" was that the apartment owners had not provided enough parking area.

HE WAS adamant in his view that the owners be requested to provide additional parking facilities, but other commissioners expressed a view that this would be out of

order inasmuch as ordinance requirements had been met.

Albert Hoskey, owner of Buckingham Manor, assured the residents and commissioners that he is considering plans for installing additional parking for his tenants. He wanted more time to complete the plans.

Commissioner Carl F. Ingraham's motion to change the Pembroke-Eton stop signs to "yield" signs for 90 days, supported by Page, carried unanimously.
