

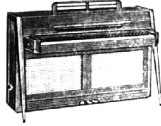
### Council Approves Special Assessment

**BEVERLY HILLS**—The council Monday okayed a special assessment of \$11,673.25 for dust and weed control and acted on two other expenditures.

The low bid by Dane Construction Co., Clawson, for fire hydrants for Birwood, Norchester and Elizabeth streets was accepted. The bid was \$4,766.50.

The sum of \$150 also was voted by council to defray cost of a survey to assist Birmingham's Baldwin Public Library in evaluating library service in Beverly Hills. The \$150 is equivalent to the same percentage paid now to Baldwin for service to residents.

### B'ham to Seek Injunction Against Mrs. Kathy Craig

Birmingham City Attorney Dean Beier will seek an injunction in Circuit Court Monday to prevent Mrs. Kathy Craig from occupying and carrying on business in her Hamilton Ave. dress shop.

Beier said the injunction, if granted, would give Mrs. Craig a "reasonable time" in which to close.

Mrs. Craig was issued a certificate of occupancy last November for the building. She said she was given all the proper permits needed to operate a business.

The businesswoman said she had spent \$5,000 to fix up the building, doing everything the city told her to do.

She has been fighting a notice from the city to vacate the building in which the shop is located.

### Red Cross Bloodmobile Visits First Baptist

A record group of blood donors is expected for the Red Cross community bloodmobile in Birmingham tomorrow, sponsored by the Women's Mission Union of the First Baptist Church.

For two weeks the church women, working under the direction of Mrs. Cornell Stancer, 1175 Key West Drive, Clawson, have been calling on prospective donors in a wide area including Bloomfield Hills, Royal Oak, Clawson, Franklin, Troy, Beverly Hills and Bloomfield Village as well as Birmingham.

Group activities were planned in a special meeting in the church parlors May 22 when Donald M. Miller, executive director of the Oakland County chapter of the American Red Cross, talked on the chapter's blood program and its importance to families locally.

Anyone willing to donate blood will be welcome at the community blood bank in the First Baptist Church tomorrow between 3 p.m. and 9 p.m. Advance appointments can be made by calling Mrs. Lewis Johnson, 539 South Bates.

### Sidewalk Law Under Study For Redraft

**BEVERLY HILLS** — "What's this sidewalk ordinance all about?" was the question of about 15 residents who appeared at Monday's council meeting.

Council members explained that the ordinance was only under study for redraft.

Village Attorney Thomas Dillon explained that the redraft sets up procedures for construction but does not add to existing council authority to build new sidewalks.

Homeowners may do the work themselves but must follow specifications. There will be a special assessment if the village does the work, Dillon said.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT** Marvin B. Cline explained that a redrafted ordinance would provide for new construction in areas where children are walking to school or where there is sufficient pedestrian traffic to warrant sidewalks.

**MEMBERS** OF the group were particularly urged to stress to prospective donors the fact that blood donated locally may be reserved for credit in the community blood bank for dispensing by the donors for their relatives and friends locally or elsewhere through the facilities of the American National Red Cross.

Miller cited many instances in which the system of blood bank credits enabled local families to extend blood relief to their relatives who are necessary.

Hugh B. Miller, 19164 Devonshire, asked if a study had been made, and Councilman Claude A. Shepard replied that one had.

**CLINE FURTHER** stated that the council wants merely to repair bad spots and to study needs of pedestrian traffic. There is no urgency, no plan to proceed immediately, he said.

Jack Gilmer, another resident, requested that the council limit the ordinance to the problem concerned with the broken sidewalks.

The ordinance was tabled for 30 days pending council study.

### 43,000 Oakland Residents Draw Social Security

Social Security benefits are providing retirement, survivors, or disability payments to 43,438 people in Oakland County, William E. LaRock, Pontiac District Manager of the Social Security Administration, announced today.

The latest available figures show that these payments total \$3,294,899 per month. The average retired worker in the county is receiving \$50.00 per month, as compared to the national average of \$76.65.

The number of people receiving benefits increased 13 per cent in 1961 over the previous year. Most of the increase resulted from the 1961 Amendments, which allow men, as well as women, to apply for reduced benefits beginning at age 62 plus the fact that the present law makes it possible for a person to receive some benefits from his Social Security while earning substantially more than \$1200.00 per year.

**LA ROCK ESTIMATES** that several hundred persons in Oakland County are missing out on social security payments, although they would be eligible for benefits if they applied. He said most of these persons have not applied because they do not understand the new changes in the law and think that anyone earning over \$1200.00 a year is barred from receiving benefits.

Of those presently receiving social security checks, the counts figures show that disability beneficiaries have had the greatest percentage increase. At the end of 1961, 1747 persons were receiving disability checks. The present figure is 2586, an increase of 49 per cent. The average disability payment in Oakland County is \$108.00. The national average is less than \$90.00.

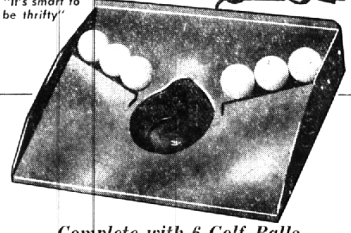
Oakland County residents in general receive higher benefit amounts than in any county in Michigan, with the exception of Wayne County.

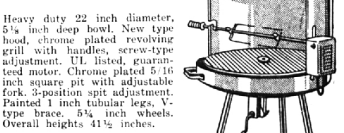
