

Arrest Pontiac Man On Narcotics Count

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—A Pontiac man was arrested Saturday afternoon at Miracle Mile Shopping center for possession of narcotics. Township Det. James Keller and State Police Det. Paul Radshaw of the Redford post made the arrest.

George H. Williams, 26, was arraigned Monday before Justice of the Peace Alice Gilbert. He stood mute and waived examination. Bond was set at \$1,500 and arraignment in Oakland Circuit Court was scheduled for Monday.

Police were tipped off by an informant, Keller said. The two detectives found a marijuana cigarette Williams' person.

Voting Place Changed By Township Board

SOUTHFIELD TOWNSHIP—Some 1000 notices will go out next week to registered voters in the Franklin, Brighton Farms and Southfield Township area, informing them that the polling place for elections has been changed from the Franklin Fire Department hall to the Franklin School.

The trustees took action Tuesday night when arrangements with the Birmingham School Board were completed. The board will store the voting machines and allow the township to use the school for voting free of charge.

The new polling location will be

in effect for the Aug. 7 primary election.

MRS. PHEOBE SIMPSON, community coordinator for the Huntley subdivision on 13 Mile Road, east of Laker, asked trustees whether subdivision residents can use Southfield Park, which backs up to the development.

The park is a public one. The trustees asked Harold Roseberry and Richard Speir, both members of the board, to draw up a set of rules and regulations regarding use of the park. It will be presented at the next board meeting July 10.

A bid for painting the outside of the village hall was also accepted at the meeting. Of two bids submitted, that of the Bloomfield Decorator Service was the lower.

TRUSTEE Hugh G. Allerton, Jr., was appointed delegate to the Southeastern Oakland County Water Authority. A. H. Gattward, also a trustee, was appointed alternate.

The renewal of the premium for the fire insurance policy on the village hall was also voted.

minimum strip around the perimeter of the northwest section, with lots of up to two acres in the middle.

The multiple structure question was settled with a compromise on buildings not to be over two stories, including a partially-exposed basement level.

THIS PROPOSAL was given the city attorney to present to the planning commission for future investigation.

Commissioner James J. Beresford agreed with the unanimous commission decision only when assured by Mayor Bugas that a three-story structure, if that's what the planning commission wanted, would not increase the density of a given area.

Commissioner Henry L. Woolfenden was also opposed to an increase in density. "The 450 families in our community could conceivably lose much of their vote if multiples increase the population."

ADDITIONAL PROBLEMS to the city government were seen by Commissioner Robert A. Frye with a population increase.

The planning commission will meet July 10 to study the city commissioner's "meeting of minds" agreement.

WNFGA Takes Stand On Development of B'ham's 66 Acres

The Birmingham Estates Branch of WNFGA has adopted a formal resolution urging the city to develop the 66 acres at the sewage disposal plant for a variety of recreational uses.

The resolution reads: "We would very much like to see the 66 acres surrounding and north of the old sewage disposal plant on Cranbrook Road near 14 Mile used for a variety of recreational uses. We are interested in the development of an area in this acreage for nature study and will support and cooperate with the Birmingham Branch in this project."

"We are also in agreement as to the advantages of an area for picnics, scouting activities and various other sports appealing to a great number of people."

County's Airport Plan Not in Federal Report

Oakland County's proposed jet airport is not included in Federal Government recommendations for and for airport development in the metropolitan area in the next five years.

In its National Airport Plan for 1962, the Federal Aviation Agency recommended that Metropolitan and Willow Run airports be improved and that one more non-airline terminal be built in the area.

Omission of Oakland's plans for a major jet field in Orion and Pontiac townships from that report should not be interpreted as an official position on the county's proposal, said James Waedekin, FAA's airport engineer for Michigan.

Although the county's goal is to construct a jet airport terminal within 10 years, it has indicated that the site might be developed in the interim for freight and corporate craft.

Waedekin said Oakland would have to produce a master plan, extensive site surveys, soil tests and assurance of local participation in costs before its application for Federal money could be considered.

The board of supervisors has deferred these studies pending a report from FAA on the county's request.

FAA's National Airport Plan for 1962 was submitted to Congress Friday.

FAA ADMINISTRATOR N. E. Halaby, however, was reported as saying in Washington that Federal money will not be available for airports which are not included in the national plan, as announced last week.

FAA's five-year plan calls for further development of Detroit City, Detroit Metropolitan and Willow Run airports and improvement of three heliports, including one in Southfield.

It also calls for expansion of facilities at Pontiac Municipal Airport, which the county board of supervisors' aviation committee has ruled out as a possible site for its proposed jet airport.

THE COUNTY has bought 445 acres, including the old Allen Airport, as part of its plans.

submitted Monday night. Ten out of a possible 12 signatures were on the petition.

Fifty per cent of the costs will be assumed by the village from the \$7,000 budgeted in major road funds for such work. Abutting property owners will be billed on a "per lot" basis if approved. A public hearing date will be set shortly.

THE COUNCIL is also considering a request by the Birmingham Board of Education to have 500 feet of Romany Way blacktopped near the intersection of Franklin Road. The school district will pay from \$1,100 to \$1,200 as its share of the cost.

A third area, a portion of Wellington from Franklin Road to the Little League baseball diamond, behind the Franklin Community church, is also under consideration for blacktopping.

The council will meet Monday night to consider the paving proposals and complete the month's agenda.
