Camp Specials At YMCA Include 'Little Giants'

The specialty of the hour these days at Birmingham YMCA is summer camps—from big to little, in far-away places or nearby to camps.

Children as young as six and seven can go to the special day camp program, known as Little Giants, scheduled again this year by the local Y.

The Little Giants are taught handicrafts, swimming and outdoor games in gatherings two or three days weekly from 9:20 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

COLLEGE STUDENTS lead the activities. They include one day each week spent boating and swimming at Kensington Park, where children are taken by YMCA buses. Other days, handicrafts, games and singing are conducted at the YMCA building at 400 E. Lincoln.

Bus service to and from the Y at a nominal fee is available from six area schools. Youngsters may be registered for one to two-week periods.

YMCA Program Secretary Conrad Ekins said this week there were still a few openings in some periods of the YMCA day camp for boys and girls eight through 12.

For children who prefer resident camps, the YMCA has information about Camp Ohioya and Camp Nissokone, both operated by the Detroit Metropolitan YMCA. Ohioya, just 20 miles from Birmingham in the Holly-Milford area, schedules four 12-day periods for boys nine through 15.

Camp Nissokone for boys eight through 15, is located on Lake Van Etten near Osoda.
