# Clarifies Views on Use Of Sewage Plant Property

To the Editor:

Because of your recent series of articles concerning the recreational development of the sewage plant property, I believe it necessary to clarify my position on the matter.

These remarks are my personal opinions and do not reflect any official action of the recreation board. The last official action by the recreation board on Sept. 15, 1960, was recommendation that the area be devoted to recreational purposes; but until there is a probability that there will be capital funds available to develop this land the board does not believe further attempts should be made to plan the development of this area or any portion thereof.

AMONG OTHER reasons, the plan would depend in part on the capital assets available for such development. The recreation board further reported that it will develop plans and priorities for the use of capital funds if and when such funds are available.

In my interview for The Eccentric, I stated that all elements of recreation should be considered before any final action is taken. I also went ahead to say that if further study and considerations show golf to be the most pressing recreational need in the city then the area should be used for that purpose.

I FEEL AS recreation director that all recreation opportunities should be provided to all residents and that all elements of the population must be taken into consideration in expending the taxpayers funds as equally and as efficiently

**Mrs. Leaf Re-elected To School Board Post**

WEST BLOOMFIELD—An incumbent school board member was re-elected and a two-mile operating tax was approved Monday by West Bloomfield School district voters.

The new levy was carried by a two-mile vote with 319 voters okaying the tax. It will not mean an increase in taxes because bond interest will be reduced by any other candidates.

Mrs. Francis M. Leaf received 383 votes. She was not opposed by any other candidates.

**B'field Hills Contributes \$100 to VTC**

BLOOMFIELD—A \$100 contribution to set Detroit's tax law on non-resident workers' tax, was given the Vigilance Tax Committee by the city commission Tuesday.

Commissioner Henry L. Woolfenden's motion was carried unanimously after commissioners agreed that the contribution would be made only to set the tax law legally tested.

The commission neither supported nor opposed the tax.

VTC officials are asking \$3,500 from suburban governments to cover court costs.

"OTHER COMMUNITIES' contributions are merely token," said Commissioner James J. Beauford, "so I think anything we may give wouldn't help that much."

He also questioned the commission's right to speak for Bloomfield citizens. "How do we know they want to oppose it?"

Mayor John S. Bugas felt the tax was "unfair" against his residents, but the VTC action "was an unreasonable patchwork affair."

IN OTHER commission action purchase of a new police car for \$1,420, with a trade-in, was approved. Low bidder was Harold Turner, Birmingham automobile dealer.

Robert Stadler, director of public safety, was appointed Bloomfield Hills delegate to the Police Chiefs' convention in Cadillac June 25-27. Police Captain Walter Sluter will accompany Stadler.

**David Cassidy Still In Critical Condition**

CRANBROOK VILLAGE—David Cassidy, 4, son of former Detroit Lion halfback Howard (Hump) Cassidy, remained in critical condition, William Beaumont Hospital, reported Wednesday.

Admitted to the hospital May 17 when he was hit by a car, David's condition has remained unchanged since.

vigilance committee," said Commissioner William E. Roberts.

"However, I feel we have to recognize that the representation we are supposed to give here.

"I am surprised at citizen interest and the desire to contribute to this fund.

"Possibly there is greater citizen interest in this than we may realize. We may be giving a wrong impression if we turn our backs on the committee."

A MOTION BY Commissioner Robert Page to increase the size of Birmingham's contribution to \$500 brought this quick response from Commissioner Charles Kenefrew:

"I would like to speak to that point. I have been surprised at the lack of public response to the request for contributions. I would like to see what response the public would make . . .

"I have a strong feeling that the core city has to be financed in some way. If the suburban communities succeed in their suit against the income tax, there is every reason to believe Detroit will increase the service rates (on water, sewers, etc.)

"Let's be sure we are reflecting the opinion of the people in Birmingham."

CONSENSUS WAS that the mayor should contact Kuhn to set up the meeting.

"If there is sufficient citizen interest, we would feel better satisfied to increase our contribution," said one commissioner when informed that the meeting had been arranged.

Review board members are Supervisor Richard, Paul Lane and Richard McClurg. They review protests on land valuation and tax assessments once a year. Their office is elective.

The appeals board may grant individual variations to the zoning ordinance. Its members are township board representative Charles Forbes, planning commission chairman Whitmer, and a third member, Thomas Papes, elected by the other two.

OTHER ELECTED officials are Justices of the Peace Elmer Dieterle and Robert Scott, and Constables Joseph Nephew and Ed Heitens Sr. All hold two-year terms.

Police chief is Melvin Will. The township employs five regular and nine auxiliary policemen.

There are three regular firemen and 28 volunteer firemen serving under Fire Chief "Red" Morgan. The township operates three fire stations and contracts fire protection to the cities of Keego Harbor and Sylvan Lake.

THE TOWNSHIP is unusual in that it provides a library for its residents. It would like to expand other facilities "for the people."

At present, its main efforts are in developing city sewage for part of the township. It hopes to bring sewers to the remaining part when an interceptor is developed in the western part.

Road improvement is another service it would like to increase when funds are available. Its capital improvements have been hampered the past few years by lack of funds.
