**Pupils Comment on Tours Of Local Bank, Eccentric**

"There's so much money, I couldn't believe it." This delightful bit of information summed up the reaction of at least one Baldwin School student who toured the Hamilton branch of the Detroit Bank and Trust Co. during the recent celebration of Michigan Week.

A less glamorous impression was made, however, on a boy from Pierce School who visited The Birmingham Eccentric with his class at about the same time. "Before we went through the newspaper building," he said, "I thought you typed the papers by hand."

THE TWO youngsters were among the many guests who toured the two institutions during the annual observance honoring the state. Their comments were contained in letters to their hosts, in which the children expressed their thanks. Their remarks ranged from the serious to the seriocomic. A group from Baldwin School

was escorted through the bank by Mrs. Evelyn Kelley and Joseph Palmer, both assistant managers at the branch office. The children were awed in the vaults and envious of people who used adding machines to solve arithmetic problems. One little boy made no bones about his feeling on the latter problem, wistfully informing Miss Kelly that he wished he "could have one in school."

ANOTHER THANKED Palmer for "showing us that 'moola,' especially that \$1,000 bill. But we didn't get even a 1962 penny." The big bills made a deep impression on more than one of the Baldwin class. As one little miss said, they "liked to hold them."

A classmate of hers said she "enjoyed seeing the upstairs and downstairs and seeing where people put their valuables," while another was glad to find out "what you do with the old money." At least one of them was completely candid and commented that he "should have looked some," presumably referring to the contents of the vaults.

THEY WERE ALL pleased with the pens given to them as were the Pierce School youngsters who were guided by Professor Bill Dove through The Eccentric.

The students received individual slugs with each child's name cast on the lead.

The presses fascinated these young students, especially two of the more imaginative. One saw a resemblance to a locomotive; another said that "the machine that folds all the papers looked like it was making paper airplanes."

Several of them agreed the press was "neat" and it actually sounded "like rock and roll music" to one Pierce pupil.

A VERY LARGE camera used in the photo engraving process elicited comments from many of this group, one of whom expressed

a reluctance to "getting shot with such a big one."

They said that many of their class "took the paper" and one proud girl said her mother "used to work at The Eccentric when she was 18."

Critery frank, one of them voiced an opinion that "the newspaper is only a small part of the business and the Averill Press gets the most customers" while a second countered with the statement that he'd "never heard of the Averill Press before."

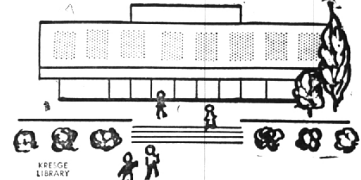
BOTH THE BANK and the newspaper were delighted with their young guests and were equally glad to receive the small mountain of broad-and-butter notes thanking them for the tours.
