Add Horsemanship To Camp Program

She loves horses and children. So equestrienne Theta Lounsbury takes to her work as naturally as the Lane Ranger takes to Silver.

The attractive, brown-eyed grandmother of six young pony riders will begin teaching horsemanship to children at Echo Park Day Camp, starting July 2.

To make the horseback riding program possible, the day camp at 4275 Echo Road, Bloomfield Hills, is planning to add a riding ring paddock and stables.

"I don't think there is any better sport or recreation for children," says instructor Lounsbury, who began horseback riding at the age of three. "It gives them a companionship and good exercise. It helps to build up self-confidence, in both children and adults, because the rider learns to be in command."

"It's excellent for teen-agers," she contends.

Mrs. Lounsbury made her early acquaintance with horses at the Missouri country place where her father raised thoroughbreds.

"Our whole family rode," says the instructor.

The three Lounsbury children, all married now, hopped into the saddle and followed down the family bridle path.

Now there are two ponies at Mrs. Lounsbury's stables on Oakley just north of Hickory Grove Road in Bloomfield Township. And when the fourth generation of horse lovers comes visiting from Taylor, Mich., and Columbus, Ohio, the pony rides are enjoyed by all six of them. Their grandmother is a veteran competitor in horse shows across the nation. She formerly owned

and operated the Birmingham Saddle Club at Long Lake and Adams Roads, Bloomfield Township.

After several years of operating a school of horsemanship and showmanship at Stonelair Farms near Columbus, Ohio, he returned to the Birmingham-Bloomfield area last fall.

Now she gets up at 5:30 a.m. to get to the stables near St. Hugo of the Hills parish and prepare for the 9 a.m. arrival of her first pupils.

This summer, she plans to start the days at her own stables, then drive to Echo Park. There her instruction will be free to all

day campers, eight through 17 years old.

AT THE DAY CAMP, Mrs. Lounsbury and advanced pupils will trot along bridle paths, wending through 91 wooded acres of the former estate "The Junipers", on which Echo Park is located.

Half of the 12 horses on which she will train young riders at Echo Park will be English saddle horses. The other six will be Western.

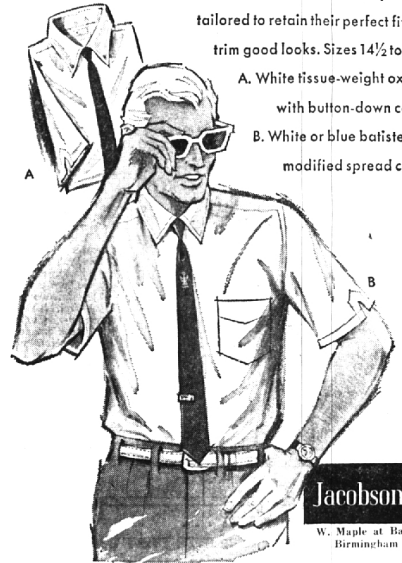
Says Echo Park Director Walter Baker, "The horseback riding will be an important part of our Teen Camp and Workshop."

The teen program opens this summer to provide fun and instruction, along with some staff responsibilities, for 11 to 17-year-old campers.

Baker says the camp's organizers are currently investigating the possibilities of a year-around riding program for Echo Park parents and children.

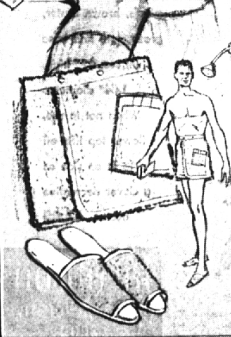
