**B'ham Youth Honored
 By Automobile Club**

Checks totaling \$175 were presented today to five young Michigan artists for their winning entries in the 18th American Automobile Association national traffic safety poster contest.

The youngsters, four of them from the Detroit area, were feted at a luncheon in the Detroit Leland hotel by Automobile Club of Michigan, which sponsors the annual competition in Michigan.

The biggest check went to 17-year-old Brian DeCarines of Jackson, whose poster illustrated the safety theme, "Watch For Turning Cars." Her design won a \$75 first place award and was chosen to be reproduced by the AAA and distributed to classrooms throughout the U.S.

Top-honored winner among Detroit-area students was Ken Alder, Jr., of 10604 Greenwood, an 11th grader at Deering high school. He accepted a check for \$50 awarded for second place. A poster submitted by Elizabeth Baring, a 17-year-old senior at East Tech, placed third behind Alder's bring-home \$20 in prize money. Her home is at 18642 Latona. Both posters illustrated the "Watch For Turning Cars" theme.

TIMOTHY BRANIGAN, 12, of 1622 Bates, Birmingham, captured a first place and \$25 in the elementary grade division of the contest. His poster illustrated the safety rule, "Walk On Left Facing Traffic." Timothy is in the 6th grade at Our Lady Queen of Martyrs school.

Nine-year-old Anne Marie Karlson, of 2477 Denham, in the 4th grade at Roosevelt school, Redford Township, received a check for \$5 at the luncheon. Her poster, also illustrating the theme "Walk On Left Facing Traffic," placed third.

Distors from more than 1,500 Michigan students were among 15,500 from throughout the country entered in the competition. Entrants were asked to illustrate one of four basic safety rules. Their designs were then judged against one another within the four school grade groups—primary, elementary, junior and senior high. The top posters in each classification were then matched in a final runoff to select designs for actual reproduction.

Some 144 Michigan students received awards or citations for their work. The checks were presented by Robert E. Lewis, of Auto Club's safety and traffic department, coordinator of the contest in Michigan.

 To Honor Nixon
 At Annual Meeting**

Carl F. Inzerhahn, chairman of the Family Law Section, American Bar Assn., announced today that former Vice President Richard M. Nixon will be its honored guest and speaker at a luncheon at the Bellevue Hotel, Tuesday, Aug. 7, during the annual meeting of the American Bar Assn. in San Francisco.

Present at the hotel table will be Nixon's former law professor at Duke University, John S. Bradway, former secretary of the Family Law Section, now a professor of law at Hastings College in San Francisco.

Lawyers interested in family law will find the three-day program of the Family Law Section of great interest. One panel discussion will be on the problems of "Child Custody and Visitation Problems"; another will be on the all-important question of "Tax Aspects of Divorce and Separation Agreements." The "Belonging Child in Court" will be the subject of another session, and the controversial subject of "Adoption" will be explored.

Other participants include Mary Conway Kohler, Judge Florence Kelley and Professor Morand Paulson, of New York; Professor Frank E. A. Sander of Harvard Law School; Portia B. E. Hume, M.D., and Judge Roger Alton Pfaff, of California; Judge Paul W. Abo, under, of Toledo, Ohio; and other experts in the field of family law.
