

State Fair Schedules Early Opening

The Michigan State Fair will open earlier than usual this year advancing the deadline for agriculture and livestock entries up to Monday, July 30.

Walter A. Goodman, general manager, explains that the Michigan State Fair, which has opened for years on Labor Day weekend will close on Labor Day this year and cautions all exhibitors to be aware of the new 1962 entry deadline and the State Fair dates, Aug. 24 through Sept. 3.

A record \$141,000 in prizes will be offered. Thousands of premium books and entry blanks have been mailed to post exhibitors. New exhibitors may obtain these by writing to the Agriculture Entry Office, Michigan State Fair, Detroit 3.

ELDON McLAHLAN, State Fair agricultural director, said that changes listed in this year's Premium Book include:

Livestock and agricultural products will not be released until 4 p. m. of the last day, Monday, September 3, so that Labor Day patrons can view them.

Last year, junior show exhibitors were allowed to exhibit only prize winning stock in the open show. They will now be permitted to show all animals in open show that they have shown in the junior show.

Premiums totaling \$100 have been added for a performance class for Tennessee Walking Horses.

Added in the sheep competition is prize money for top-rated pairs of yearling rams.

But gone with automation is the Blade Sheep Shearing Contest. There will continue to be Electric Shearing Contests and a Blade Shearing Demonstration. Three breeds of sheep, the American Merino, Delaware Merino and Karakul, have been deleted from competition due to the lack of interest in these breeds.
