Localite Wins U. of M. Service Award

One of the highlights of the University of Michigan's 116th commencement was the presentation at the annual alumni luncheon of the Distinguished Alumni Service Award to Mrs. Russell Strickland of Bloomfield Hills.

The citation was presented by University of Michigan President H. H. Hatcher and signed by Frank Orman of Birmingham, president of the Alumni Association.

The citation read: "Bountifully endowed with every attribute highly prized in human society, Marcia Cornell Strickland has given unstintingly of her vital energy and great gift of leadership to a myriad of worthwhile endeavors. No student ever brought higher academic credentials to the university when first she entered with her class of 1929 Literary. This promise was quickly converted into productive performance as she coupled exceptional participation in student activities with topmost scholastic achievement."

"Her alumni years have been similarly marked with distinctive service in many areas including the presidency of her class, leadership in the affairs of her Delta Gamma Sorority, chairmanship of the Alumnae Council, and directorship of both the Development Council and the Alumni Association."

Other officers attending include Mrs. Miles A. Turpin, South Pasadena, Calif., secretary; Mrs. W. P. VanNess, Fort Wayne, Ind., treasurer; Mrs. Daniel C. Hay, Santa Monica, Calif., National Panhellenic Conference Delegate, and Miss Roberta Abernathy, Columbus, Ohio, executive secretary.

The director of the Delta Gamma Foundation, Mrs. Russell S. Strickland, Bloomfield Hills, and her committee will have an active part in the convention. The Delta Gamma Foundation is the culmination of many years of fraternity service to campus and community, to university and nation. It is a true reflection of the fraternity world at work for others. An official project—Sight Conservation and Aid to the Blind—was added to the work in 1936 and is the largest division of the Foundation, which also includes a fine program of Grants and Loans.

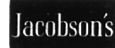
EACH YEAR scholarship and loans are made available to orthodox technical and to teachers and consultants for visually handicapped children, as well as in undesignated fields for both graduate and undergraduate members, and non-members.

The Foundation also embodies an International Education program which makes living in Delta Gamma Chapter houses possible for a selected group of students from abroad. Delta Gamma pioneered this field for fraternal groups. More and more Delta Gamma is becoming synonymous with work with the blind, aid to the visually handicapped, and prevention of blindness. Local chapters decide upon and finance their own project work, but work through the Foundation committee which serves as a clearing house for information and directs members to sources of professional advice.

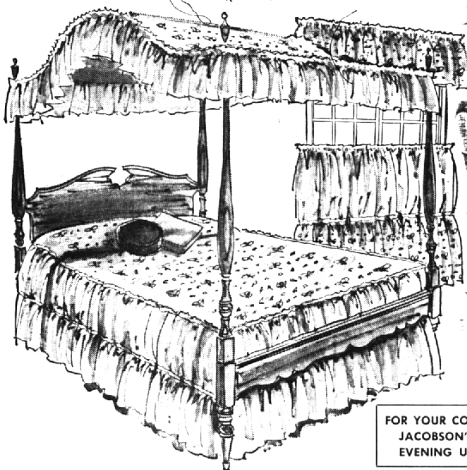

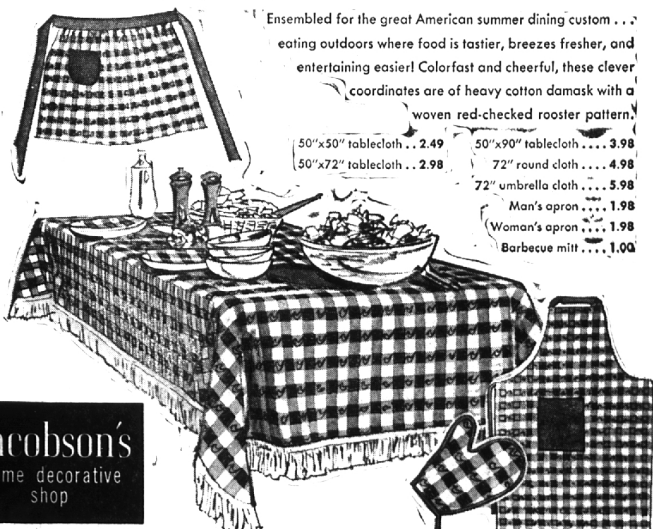
