that a good mulch for preventing weed growth in out-of-the-way beds is SAWDUST treated with NITROGEN. Not pretty but effective.

that many of the cuttings, brownings, etc., on the leaves of plants are due to BUGS rather than disease. Spray thoroughly with McLELLAN-BALL INSECT SPRAY or ISOTOX. If you think disease may be present ADD PHALTAN to the insecticide.

that the bright green, broad-bladed grasses showing in clumps in your lawn may be eliminated with spot GRASS KILLER. Available in AEROSOL BOMBS or powder form.

Otherwise, wait until late August and then GO AFTER IT.

that two (2) methods of controlling weed growth in your garden and shrub beds are available.

- One inch of PEAT MOSS or two inches of BUCK-WHEAT HULLS. Apply after the beds are weeded and cultivated.
- Spray with SESONE after weeding and cultivating. Do this every 6 weeks (1 1/2 months). Much cheaper and VERY EFFECTIVE if done honestly.
