Weather and Crowds Excellent at Detroit Horse Show

The horses have never stopped livelier, the stables have seldom been busier, and the turnstiles are revolving at a fascinating rate.

All this at the Bloomfield Open Hunt Club.

The 46th annual Detroit Horse Show is in progress at BOH, the

largest outdoor hunting and jumping show in the United States. It began Tuesday and will run through July 1.

As the country's largest outdoor horse show, the affair offers more division and class competition than the average spectator could see in a three-week period.

Coupled with the show is the glittering Hunt Fair, which in-

cludes trinket sales, refreshments, and a sizable number of local shops open for business.

Both the show and fair will benefit the Michigan State University (MSU) scholarship fund. MSU, located on the 1,000 acre estate of Mrs. Alfred G. Wilson and the late Mr. Wilson, is entering its third year.

Over 400 entries are included in the horse show, among them most

of the jumpers, hunters, riders and dressage horses and riders from across the country.

Bert McIntire, of BOH, is manager of the show.

DRESSAGE, the most painstakingly exact and demanding of all horse competition, has been added to the Detroit show this year in the form of the National Open Dressage Competition. The winner will receive the Tuttle Trophy Challenge Trophy emblematic of the United States Open Championship in dressage. (See "Bloomfield Hosts Dressage" in June 21 Eccentric sports).

The results of the Tuttle Trophy competition may have a marked bearing on the selection of the U. S. dressage teams for the next Pan American and Olympic games.

Dressage, an event in which the rider issues commands to his horse through barely noticeable leg and hand movements, requires perfect coordination between horse and rider. Nationally known contestants in Dressage competition from the Birmingham area are Charles D. Grant and James M. Jones.

In addition to Dressage, the show is divided into divisions of Equitation; Junior (13 through 18) Exhibitors, working hunter; Junior Exhibitor, jumper; Hunter, regular conformation; Hunter, green conformation; Hunter, regular working; Hunter, green working; Amateur, miscellaneous; Jumper, green; Jumper, open; Arabian; and Mor-

Stables, professional; Larry Gleffe, 16, junior; Chris Jones, junior; Violet Hopkins, BOH instructor.

Other area contestants are 1961 Reserch Champions Robert Egan, Allison Cram, Debbie Willson, Chris Jones, Robert Lambert, Sharon Blinsky, Sue and Peter Foley.

AREA RIDERS who won championships at the indoor Madison Square Garden Horse Show last

November are Bob Sample, Rick and Allison Cram, Krystyn Glancy, Debbie Willson and Bob Lambert.

Featured among the more outstanding attractions are the Onondarka Riders from California, Victor Hitch, and Joe Brosie, the "fastest gun alive."

The colorful Onondarka Riders, all girls under 18 years of age, ride their horses bareback, without the benefit of bridles, and do all

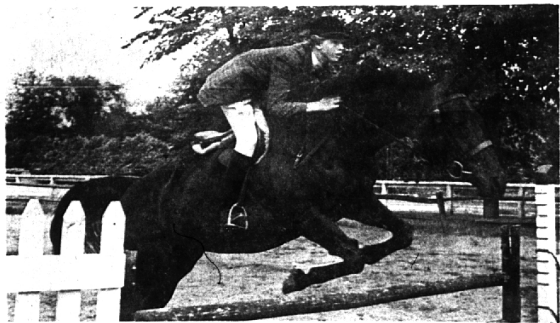
maneuvers over a three and one half foot jump. Twenty jumps are made by the girls, who are in complete charge of the care and feeding of their individual horses.

Fifteen riders are in the drill, plus three flag carriers and twelve jumpers. The youngest of the girls is twelve, and in addition to training horses, all must maintain a "B" average in school to remain on the drill team.

The aim of the program is to "organize and develop an outstanding junior golf program in the

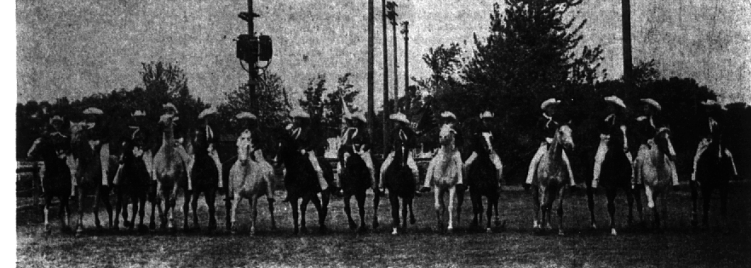
local areas," according to national Jaycee officials.

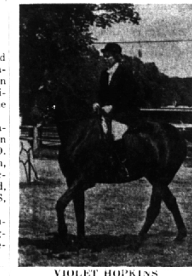
