

Incumbents Unopposed In B'ham, B'field Hills

With only incumbents filing for nomination in both Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills, the April 2 elections in both cities will be open-shut affairs except for a charter amendment on which Birmingham voters will pass judgment.

As the Saturday deadline for filing petitions rolled by last week, City Commissioners Carl Ingraham and Charles Bentz were the only two candidates to file for their expiring commission posts. Both offices will be held for three years.

INCUMBENT Baldwin Library Board members Mrs. Carolyn Vogt and Daniel Nesbitt will also be unopposed for their two-year terms.

Voters will also express their wishes on a charter amendment which would permit the city to codify all city ordinances without publishing the entire code in the newspaper.

In Bloomfield Hills, Mayor James A. Berestoff and Commissioner Henry L. Woodford were the only two candidates to file for their two expiring commission posts. The terms are for two years.

HOMER J. Murphy, currently commissioner, was the only candidate.

B'ham Saves Money on 12 Town Payment

City commissioners decided Monday night to pay 84 per cent of Birmingham's total assessment for the Twelve Towns Relief Drainage Board, recognizing that construction bids were lower than estimated. The city is paying 84 per cent of their assessments, rather than 100 per cent of the original estimate.

Birmingham has sold \$1,500,000 in bonds to help pay its entire assessment in advance.

DIRECTOR of Finance J. H. Purkiss, Jr., pointed out that the savings acquired by having to pay the 84 per cent, coupled with other bond proceeds, has resulted in a total of \$378,565.47 in excess of requirements.

Commissioners accepted Purkiss' recommendation to transfer the money to the Debt Service Reserve, which would have the effect of reducing the annual debt requirements to be raised by taxation to about \$100,000 per year for 20 years.

Married and the father of three children, he is a sales representative for the local branch Automobile Club. Winner of the key man award is required to be a member of the Birmingham Jaycees. The requirement does not apply to the top award won by Adams.

Merchants Chided On Snow Removal

Commissioner William H. Burgum chided some merchants last week for their "poor citizenship attitude."

Burgum chastized businessmen for failure to remove snow from sidewalks in front of any along-side of their establishments.

Part of the problem, he said, may be the loss of contact between the city and the merchants that came with the patrolmen on the beat.

"I get a little fed up," Burgum declared, "when businessmen request additional funds to keep the streets on Sunday and then don't remove three inches of snow from their sidewalks."

He suggested that merchants shovel snow off the walks on the side streets passing their stores as well as on the main, fronting streets.

Volunteers to Organize For Romney Campaign

An interim steering committee of four persons has been named to co-ordinate the many volunteer groups forming behind George Romney's campaign for governor of Michigan.

Romney said the committee would soon announce a statewide meeting which is to be held in Detroit within about two weeks, when the different groups will gather to

chart their course and set common goals for their part in the forthcoming campaign.

NAMED WERE Dr. John T. Dempsey, former Detroit television station news analyst, who will be chairman of the panel; Wallace C. Strobel, Saginaw businessman; Lloyd M. Coffey, counselor in Detroit public school system, and Mrs. Howard Lichterman, former president of the Michigan League of Women Voters from Royal Oak.

Romney, of Bloomfield Hills, former president and chairman of American Motors Corp., thanked the many groups for pledging their support.

"Since I am currently devoting my time to the Constitutional Convention, I have yet to find the time to coordinate the numerous volunteer groups which are developing around the state in my behalf," Romney said.

"I AM DELIGHTED with the spontaneous interest and enthusiasm which many volunteer groups are showing in my campaign. Within a short time we expect to organize the efforts of all of them

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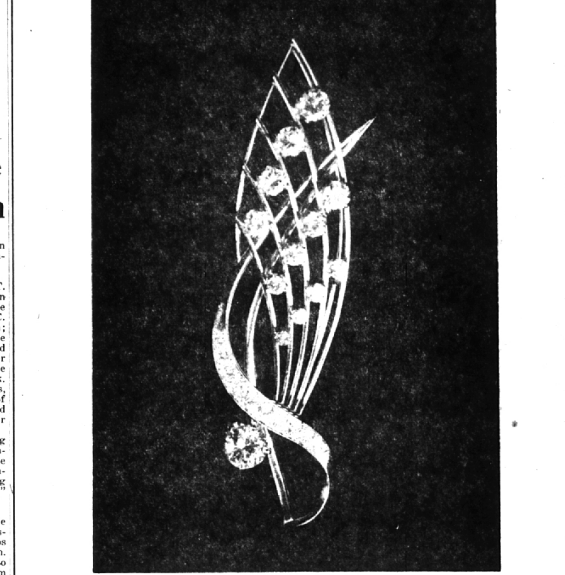
