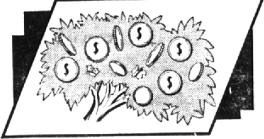

ADVERTISEMENT FOR BIDS

The Board of Education of the School District of the City of Birmingham, Michigan, will receive sealed bids for the construction and completion of a Storage and Service Building at the Service Facility, East Lincoln at Eton, Birmingham, Michigan, until 2:00 P.M., E.S.T., Friday, March 16, 1962, at the office of the Board of Education, Chester Street, Birmingham, Michigan, at which time and place all bids will be publicly opened and read aloud.

Separate sealed proposals are invited for the following sections of the work:

- PROPOSAL "A"—ARCHITECTURAL TRADES
- PROPOSAL "B"—MECHANICAL WORK
- PROPOSAL "C"—ELECTRICAL WORK
- PROPOSAL "D"—PREFABRICATED FREEZER UNIT

Each proposal shall be accompanied by a certified check or bid bond executed by an approved Surety Company in an amount not less than five percent (5%) of the proposal amount, payable to the Board of Education of the School District of the City of Birmingham, Michigan, as security for the acceptance of the Contract.

Proposals must be on forms furnished by the Architect and must list proposed subcontractors and material suppliers, or manufacturers, together with any proposed substitutions for required Base Proposal materials.

Plans and specifications may be obtained on and after Monday, March 5, 1962, at the office of the Architect, Jickling & Lyman Architects, 261 Daines, Birmingham, Michigan.

A check in the amount of twenty-five dollars (\$25) must be submitted as a deposit for each set of plans and specifications, same to be refunded upon return of plans and specifications in good condition within ten (10) days of the opening of bids.

Accepted bidders will be required to furnish satisfactory Performance Bond and Labor and Material Bond, each in the amount of 100% of the Contract, the total cost of which shall be paid by the accepted bidder.

All proposals shall remain firm for thirty (30) days after official opening of bids.

The Board of Education reserves the right to reject any or all bids in whole or in part, and to waive any informalities therein.

Behind The Store Fronts

Richard J. Wilson, of Wilson Drug Co., and John Clark, of Union Lake, were Oakland County council delegates to the recent state Pharmaceutical Association meeting in Kalamazoo.

In the light of action taken, the meeting probably was one of the association's most important gatherings ever held. With over 250 members voting, the association officially changed its constitution to permit affiliation with the American Pharmaceutical Association (A.P.A.), with headquarters in Washington, D.C.

By this action, the Michigan group became the first of the 50 states to adopt an integrated membership structure with the A.P.A. and the local associations.

Thus, "Pharmacists in Michigan became members of the American Pharmaceutical Association, the Michigan State Pharmaceutical Association, and their local association."

Pharmacy associations in other states are expected to follow the lead of Michigan pharmacists in changing their constitutions to permit national affiliation.

The attending doctor in this area were Howard Coe, president of the Oakland County Pharmaceutical Association, and Tom Mills, both of Mills Pharmacy; and Edward Kurth, of the Wilson Drug Co.

Well, Marian announced last fall that she had decided to stay home for a while. But, it wasn't long until it dawned on her that there was not a single yarn or fabric shop in her home town of Rochester.

And so it is that last Friday and Saturday marked the opening of The Village Yarn Shop in Rochester at 302 W. University Drive (formerly Walton or Pontiac Rd.). Jane Christensen is Marian's partner in the business.

Besides yarn, the shop handles needle-point bags and crewel embroidery. Alterations and re-weaving are also offered. A glider machine adds the finishing touch, Marian says.

ON THE LOWER east side of Detroit in 1914 Nathan Hack founded the Hack Shoe Co. The main offices and store have long since (1925) taken over the fifth floor of the Mutual Building on Grand Circus Park.

From this beginning some 46 years ago the Hack Co. has specialized in correct and corrective shoe fittings. Today, Nathan Hack (famed inventor of the Ripple Sole) is "retired" on the West Coast, and in Arizona. That is, as retired as a man of his boundless energies can be.

Today in Michigan, sons Morton and Leonard carry on the traditions of the Hack Shoe Co. Both

brothers are active in shoe association work. Morton is a past president of the Michigan Retail Shoe Association, and is a licensed chiropodist. Both are dedicated to the orthopedic fitting of footwear.

And so, today, the Hack Shoe Co. opened the doors of its brand new store at 235 Pierce St. The Birmingham store is the fourth in the Detroit area. "We are looking forward to serving our many friends and customers in this area," Morton Hack said. John C. Hatte will manage the Pierce St. store.

Ford Tractor Names Englishman Chief Engineer

James E. Bywater, a veteran of 21 years with Ford Motor Co., Ltd., at Dagenham, England, has been named chief engineer of Ford's Tractor and Implement division, with headquarters at Birmingham.

He succeeds R. J. Miller, who has resigned. He becomes a member of the division's operating committee, and reports to Merritt D. Hill, Ford vice president and divisional general manager.

A native of Morley in Yorkshire, England, Bywater was educated at Morley Grammar School and at Leeds Technical College before entering Essex Technical College as a Ford Motor Company scholar-ship.

In the 21 year period from 1939 to 1960, Bywater advanced through a series of engineering positions with the Dagenham organization, including executive engineering and implements; manager of research of all British Ford products; and assistant chief engineer for cars, trucks, engines and tractors.

FROM 1960 to February, 1962, he had been engineering director of Central, Ltd. at Newton Abbot, Devon, England, major manufacturer of gas turbine blades, transmissions, boilers, axles and other industrial products.

While with Ford of England, Bywater served on numerous international tractor and implement standards committees, and led the British delegation in its tractor standardization work at Paris in 1962 and Lisbon in 1964.
