**Senate Committee
Kills Bill for College
In Oakland County**

A bill to provide a community college in Oakland County failed to pass the State Senate education committee, Sen. Farrell E. Roberts' bill would have created a separate community college board to administer several new institutions here, after a vote of the senate.

Sen. Roberts said death of the bill pointed out "why we need to reposition the senate. The out-state senators don't understand the needs of our area."

The committee is composed of five out-state senators and one from the urban metropolitan area. According to Farrell, committee members said there was no need for the bill as several now on the books provide for communities to join together to set up such a college. Roberts said these bills do not serve the purpose in Oakland.

In his MSUO speech, Cousins commented on the resumption of nuclear testing by the Soviet Union and the United States; the United Nations bond issue, support of which is urged by President Kennedy and UN operations in the Congo. Cousins recently returned from the Congo.
