ORDINANCE NO. 54

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 38 ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF THE SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM OF THE VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS; PROVIDING FOR THE FIXING AND COLLECTION OF RATES AND CHARGES FOR THE USE OF SAID SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM AND FOR CONNECTING TO THE SAME; PROVIDING FOR THE ALLOCATION AND USE OF THE REVENUES DERIVED FROM THE COLLECTION OF SUCH RATES AND CHARGES; PROVIDING FOR THE DISPOSITION OF SEWAGE IN THE VILLAGE, MAKING CERTAIN METHODS OF THE DISPOSITION OF SEWAGE UNLAWFUL, MAKING IT UNLAWFUL UNDER CERTAIN CIRCUMSTANCES TO FAIL TO CONNECT PREMISES WITH AVAILABLE PUBLIC SEWERS, IMPOSING FINES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF, AND PROVIDING FOR OTHER MATTERS RELATING THERETO.

The Village of Beverly Hills Ordains:

Section 1.01. That Section 4.01 (b) of Ordinance No. 38 be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 4.01, (b). In addition to the Evergreen Charge, all premises connecting directly or indirectly to the sewer acquired and constructed from the proceeds of sale of the General Obligation Bonds shall pay a debt service charge of \$225.50, said charge to be paid at the time that connection is made to any sewer connecting to said sanitary sewers acquired and constructed from the proceeds of sale of said General Obligation Bonds, or at the time connection is made directly to said sewers constructed from the proceeds of sale of said General Obligation Bonds.

As an alternative, said debt service charge may be paid by premises on which a building is located on the effective date of this Ordinance over a period not exceeding fifteen (15) years. In the event that the owner of such premises elects to make payment over a period of fifteen (15) years, the payment shall be made annually on April 1st following the date when connection is made and on April 1st of each year thereafter, in accordance with the following schedule:

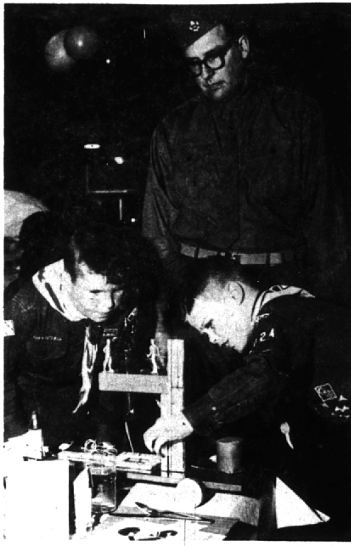

At any time during the said fifteen year period, any premises may prepay the balance of said connection charge by paying a sum equal to the product resulting from multiplying a number of installments actually paid in accordance with the foregoing schedule by \$15.30. The debt service charge provided for in this sub-paragraph (b) shall, in this Ordinance, hereinafter be referred to as the "Bond Charge."

Section 2.01. This Ordinance shall take effect 10 days after its publication.

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CITY OF BIRMINGHAM ORDINANCE NO. 578

AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 3.3 OF ORDINANCE NO. 527 OF THE ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM AND THE ZONING MAP, BY ADDITION OF A SECTION TO BE KNOWN AS SECTION 3.3-25.

THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM ORDAINS:

Section 1. That Section 3.3 of Article 3 of Ordinance No. 527 be amended by addition of a Section to be known as Section 3.3-25, said Section to read as follows:

Section 3.3-25. Property at 546 Ridgedale, also described as Lot #24, Ridgedale Park Subdivision, shall be changed from its present classification of R-2 Single-Family Residential Zone District to R-4 Two-Family Residential Zone District.

Section 2. The Zoning Map attached to Ordinance No. 527 shall be deemed modified to incorporate this change.

Con-Con Report

Consider Finance, Taxation Sections

The Finance and Taxation sections of the new Constitution are undergoing preliminary debate and received tentative approval. After being edited by the Committee on Style and Drafting, the provisions will be brought back for second and third readings.

Whether they will survive unchanged is anybody's guess. Some members of the Committee on Education have indicated they are willing to do away with earmarking of school funds if earmarking for roads is also killed. The committee has postponed action pending developments.

THIS SITUATION developed following the surprise action of the Convention in killing the 15-mill tax limitation, giving control to the legislature to set the rate limitation.

The action brought conflicting responses from three ranking members of the Committee on Finance and Taxation, which had recommended keeping a limitation in the constitution. Its chairman, D. Hale Brake, former state treasurer and known as Mr. Rural Republican, vigorously defended the limit and said it should be reinstated. "The limitation gives a tangible something to tie to, a starting place, an inherent right to vote when tax rates get higher than 15 mills," he explained.

But Richard H. Austin (D-Detroit), certified public accountant and 2nd vice-chairman of the committee, characterized the killing of the limitation as one of the best actions taken, "because it is the first real breakthrough in getting rid of Constitutional taxing restrictions."

AGREEING WITH Austin was Richard C. VanDusen (R-Birmingham), who said, "Giving the Legislature responsibility for tax rate limitations is a far-sighted way to protect property owners from excessive taxation. The Legislature can set a reasonable limit on tax rates. The 15-mill limit does not apply to cities, villages and school bond issues."

The remainder of the committee program, however, has been generally approved. It includes limiting tax assessments to 50 per cent of cash value, uniformity and a prohibition of a graduated income tax, all of which were bitterly attacked. Earmarking of weight and gasoline taxes for roads was unopposed, but

AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 3.3 OF ORDINANCE NO. 527 OF THE ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM AND THE ZONING MAP, BY ADDITION OF A SECTION TO BE KNOWN AS SECTION 3.3-26.

THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM ORDAINS:

Section 1. That Section 3.3 of Article 3 of Ordinance No. 527 be amended by addition of a section to be known as Section 3.3-26, said Section to read as follows:

Section 3.3-26. Property at 1078 Hazel, on the southwest corner of Adams and Hazel, described as Lots #68, 69, 70, 71, 72, 73 and the easterly 10 ft. of lot #67 of Subdivision #1 shall be changed from its present classification of R-2 Single-Family Residential Zone District to R-5 Multiple-Family Residential Zone District.

Section 2. The Zoning Map attached to Ordinance No. 527 shall be deemed modified to incorporate this change.

Scholarship Testing Set For March 10

Many eleventh grade students in Birmingham Groves and Seaholm High Schools plan to take the 1962 National Merit Scholarship qualifying test, according to Charles Lundy and Rose Wagner, principals of the respective schools.

The test will be administered at the schools 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, March 10. All students who wish to be considered for Merit Scholarship awards in 1962 must take the test at that time.

The qualifying test is a three-hour examination of educational development. The test is the first step in the eight-step competition for four-year Merit Scholarships provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and by sponsoring corporations, foundations, associations, unions, and individuals.

THE NUMBER of scholarships awarded in any year depends upon the extent of sponsor participation. In 1961, 945 Merit Scholarships were awarded; 656 were provided by 133 sponsors and 289 by the Merit Corporation. There are 3,275 Merit Scholars attending 403 colleges in the current academic year.

Test scores of students examined in March will be reported to their schools by Mr. E. E. McEwen, used by counselors to help students make decisions about college and field of study. Many students who do not expect to win a scholarship take the test to learn their individual strengths and weaknesses.

Some 10,000 semifinalists, the highest scorers in each state, will be named early next fall. Names of semifinalists are published in a booklet distributed to all colleges and other sources of financial aid for undergraduates. Further, their names and test scores are sent to colleges they express an interest in attending as their first or second choices. Order of preference is not shown.

AN ADDITIONAL 25,000 students, selected on a national basis, receive letters of commendation for high performance on the qualifying test. These students are considered for special awards made through the Merit Corporation, and their names and test scores are also sent to their first- and second-choice colleges.

Each semifinalist will be asked to take a second examination. Those who receive their high performance will become finalists in the Merit Program. Winners of Merit Scholarships are selected on the basis of school records and recommendation test scores, extracurricular activities, leadership ability, and accomplishments in at least one of the sciences. Each finalist is awarded a certificate of merit attesting to his outstanding performance.

THE SCHOLARSHIP stipends are based on annual income and the minimum award is \$100 and the maximum is \$1500. The average stipend awarded to freshman Merit scholars in 1961 was \$847. Each scholarship constitutes a form of educational insurance, since the stipend may be increased at any time if the student's financial situation changes during the four-year term of the scholarship.

Supplementary grants are usually made to the colleges that the scholars attend.
