## Fraud Count Exam Faced By Williamson

Former Birmingham resident Stewart Gordon Williamson was arraigned Wednesday morning before Judge John C. Emery Jr. on three counts.

HE IS CHARGED with larceny by conversion, gross fraud and cheat at common law and obtaining money under false pretenses.

Williamson demanded an examination and was held pending \$15,000 bond until a later date.

ACCORDING TO police and the Oakland County prosecutor's office, Williamson, who in 1959 formed a corporation under the name of American Bowling Products Inc., and in 1961 changed both the firm name to Bowling Products Inc. and his name from William Williamson to Bill Williams, entered into agreement with several investors to produce special polyethylene plastic bowling pins and sell franchises for their distribution.

Williamson sold the franchises, said Lt. Merlin Holmquist, but failed to furnish investors with the pins.

Williamson's attention was brought to the matter through investors' complaints filed with the Oakland County prosecutor's office.

The complainants, according to the prosecutor's office, invested in Williamson's company with the understanding that they were purchasing options on franchises to sell pins in certain territories.

In each case contracts were drawn up, according to the complainants, and Williamson told the investors that the pins were being tested by the American Bowling Congress in Milwaukee, Wis., and that patents were pending.

Investors, according to the complainants, assumed that the pins were the same synthetic plastic pins written about in the official Bowling Journal magazine.

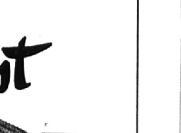

## This Doctor Prescribes Activity for Longer Life

"Retirement" is a word they can just throw away as far as 80-year-old Dr. John S. Lambie, present at the surprise luncheon. Still plugging away at his third career, Dr. Lambie, 280 Aspen, was the surprised guest of honor at a party observing his 80th birthday last week.

The luncheon was held in the Oakland County Health Center where he has been health program coordinator since 1954. He became deputy director of the South Oakland office two years before that.

**PUBLIC HEALTH** has been his field for 48 of his 55 years in medicine. Early in his career, he had a private practice for five years. Once he unbent enough to take two years off.

That was after his second career in 1949, when he completed 22 years as plant physician at the Fisher Body Division of General Motors in 1949.

An even earlier "retirement" occurred in 1923 after a long service with the Army.

**THE FATHER** OF four daughters and one son, Dr. Lambie can boast 14 grandchildren and—only a few days before his 80th—became

the great-grandfather of Baby Derry Dec.

Three of his daughters were present at the surprise luncheon. They are Mrs. Aimee May, Mrs. Sam Henderson and Roxanne Lambie, all Birmingham residents.

The doctor, who expects to continue at the health center, believes his work in promoting the use of Salk vaccine in the county is his most important achievement.

**HIS WORK** IS primarily the coordination of the tuberculosis detection program within the county. Another of his projects has been the development of an organization plan for health services in times of disaster.

He would like to see more emphasis put on teaching "prevention" in medical schools.

His viewpoints are as strong as his zest for life. A man should continue to grow, he believes, for when that "ceases, life is dead."

He's opposed to compulsory retirement at the age of 65.

And when it comes to "old people's clubs," he's not having any. He's too busy looking ahead "to live in the past."
