New AAA Office to Open in Lathrup

LATHRUP—Officials from four South Oakland communities are slated to join Automobile Club of Michigan representatives Friday noon to formally open the Auto Club's newest division office at Southfield and 10½ Mile Road in Lathrup. The new \$150,000 building will serve as area headquarters for some 12,000 AAA members in Lathrup, Southfield, Oak Park and Berkley. The new facility also houses area offices of the Detroit Automobile Inter-Insurance Exchange, the Club's sister organization.

The brick and cut stone one-story building is of contemporary design with all service facilities on one level. The site is 280-by-100 feet and accommodates 48 parking spaces. Eighteen employees are assigned to the new office, including five membership counselors and two insurance claim representatives. Manager is Theodore A. Battista. The new office is the fourth AAA facility to be established in Oakland County. Others are in Pontiac, Birmingham and Royal Oak.

Lathrup Delays Fee Payment For Inspections

LATHRUP—Final payment to the city engineers—for inspection fees after the 120-day contract period for the recently completed sanitary sewer system—will await a report from City Attorney Everett Hayes.

About \$66 of the final bill (\$122), submitted by Ayres, Lewis, Norris and May, is for inspection fees on the metering station completed after the contract time limit. The remainder of the total bill was for inspection on two sewer spurs.

COUNCILMEN DID NOT question the bill for inspection of the spurs. All agreed, however, that the city should not have been liable for the post-contract metering station inspection charges.

Hayes said, "if we had known of the extra charges earlier, we would have probably have felt the responsibility was the contractor's. The contractor, Flannett Brothers, could then have worked the matter out with his sub-contractors who were responsible for the delay, council members agreed."
