CHARTER AMENDMENT

1. Shall Section 3, Chapter XI, of the Village Charter be amended to read as follows?

Section 3. The cost of all construction, improvement and maintenance of highways, streets and alleys within the Village shall be paid for in accordance with the general laws of the State governing the construction, improvement and maintenance of highways, streets and alleys within a village. In addition, the Council may determine that the whole, or any part, of the cost of the construction or improvement of highways, streets and alleys within the Village shall be defrayed by special assessment upon the property especially benefited. The Council shall by general ordinance prescribe a complete special assessment procedure.

2. And shall Chapter IX of the Village Charter be amended by adding a new Section 11 thereto to read as follows? Section 11. The Council, subject to the applicable provisions of law, may authorize the borrowing of money, in anticipation of the payment of special assessments made for the purpose of the construction or improvement of highways, streets and alleys within the Village. Such special assessment bonds shall be both an obligation of the special assessment district and a general obligation of the Village. All collections on each special assessment roll, to the extent that the same are pledged for the payment of the principal of, and interest on, bonds issued in anticipation of the payment thereof, shall be set apart in a separate fund for the payment of such principal and interest and shall be used for no other purpose.

Chairmen will be named for Spiritual Foundations Day, Sunday; Government Day (formerly known as Mayors Exchange Day), Monday; Hospitality Day, Tuesday; Livelihood Day, Wednesday; Education Day, Thursday; Heritage Day, Friday; and Youth Day, Saturday.

OAKLAND COUNTY chairman Florence H. Willett, mayor of Birmingham, met with community chairmen at a kick-off luncheon at Bloomfield Open Hunt Club, Bloomfield Hills last week.

Mrs. Willett emphasized that the 16 communities participating in this year's Michigan Week compares to only seven last year. She encouraged the local community chairmen to prepare a timetable for their local arrangements and to maintain a file of activities and reports for the benefit of future chairmen.

Virgil LaMarre, representing regional chairman Charles F. Adams, showed slides of Michigan scenes to help illustrate the purposes and goals of Michigan Week.

MILT KENDRICK, state chairman for product of the year and achievement of the year awards, urged community participation in the two aspects of Michigan Week.

He pointed out that Oakland

County's selection of the Tempast as product of the year last year was second place in the state competition.

The achievement award, to be given in recognition of group endeavor, was originated for this year, Kendrick explained.

"It can go to your Chamber of Commerce, the city government, a service club—to any group that you feel has achieved something outstanding for your community." State winners will be chosen in both the achievement and product categories from the 16 regional selections, Kendrick explained.
