ment set up not more than two feet from the nest. When the mother came bringing food, she made no protest. Some idea of the prevalence of these birds in our community can be seen from the Audubon Christmas bird census. The day's count was 865 juncos as against 2,692 for the most abundant species, the tree sparrow.

## B of E to Add Courses To Curriculum in Fall

New courses in junior and senior high school will be added to the curriculum in September as the result of study by the staff curriculum committee and the recommendation of the Citizens' Curriculum Committee.

The expansion of the course offerings is made possible, in part, by the added financial support approved by the voters last November.

The improvements reflect the development and expansion of knowledge particularly in the fields of mathematics, science, foreign languages and social studies.

Improvement in the foreign language program will provide a six-year sequence in Spanish and French. Seventh grade students will be required to take either conversational Spanish or conversational French. Some of the homework will be in the form of recordings.

LANGUAGES WILL continue as electives in the eighth through twelfth grades and the program will be broadened further, if a teacher of Russian can be found. At the present time, about 50 per cent of the students in Birmingham elect a foreign language.

The science emphasis in seventh and eighth grades will be on the earth sciences such as geology, oceanography, astronomy and meteorology (weather and climate), replacing the current general science course.

Students in the ninth grade will continue to study general science with biology for the capable student. Senior science (11 and 12th grades) will emphasize the physical sciences such as chemistry, physics.

Dr. William Forbes, coordinator of the science program, kindergarten through twelfth grades, is implementing and up-dating the total science program.

SPEECH has been added as a requirement for graduation, beginning with the graduating class of 1966. Ninth graders will have the opportunity to take basic speech, although the speech I course will be available in private.

Motorists who regularly use Oakland were granted further relief Monday night when city commissioners approved a resolution prohibiting parking on the south side of Oakland between Woodward and Fernale avenues. Also banned will be parking on the north side of the street for 100 feet east of Woodward.

The newly-created foundation, with offices in New York, has organized a nation-wide campaign to restore the alphabet to its proper place as the basis for elementary reading instruction in English.

Among the foremost authorities on phonics and education who have already joined the council, are the principals of 50 leading preparatory schools.
