Birmingham League Extends Program To Include Schools

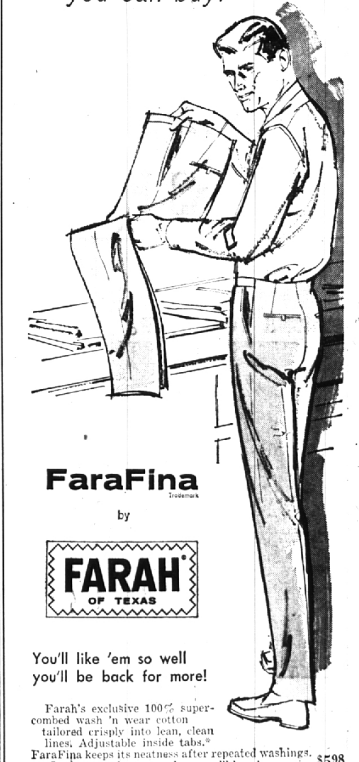

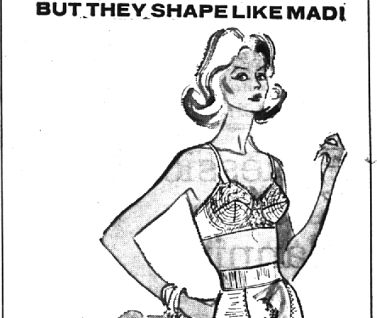

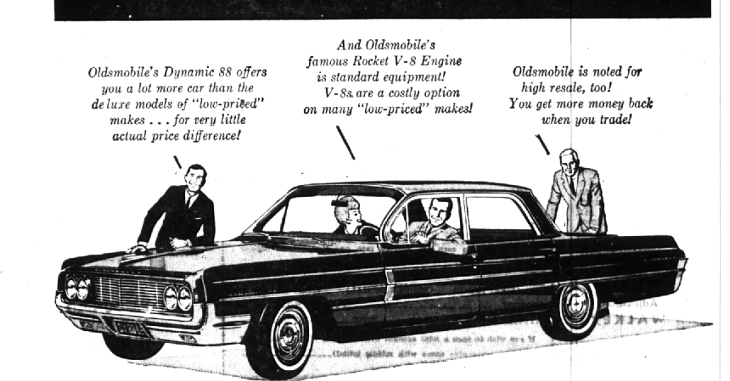
