**THE BIRMINGHAM** - Grosse Pointe rivalry is fast becoming one of the keenest in the state. In the 1959-60 campaign Grosse Pointe edged Seaholm by one-half a point to take the state honors. The following year, the Maples compiled a total of 22 counties. The state meet while the Red Devils managed 22. The title went to Plymouth.

The top trophy winners of the day were Ted and Ruth Nicholl.

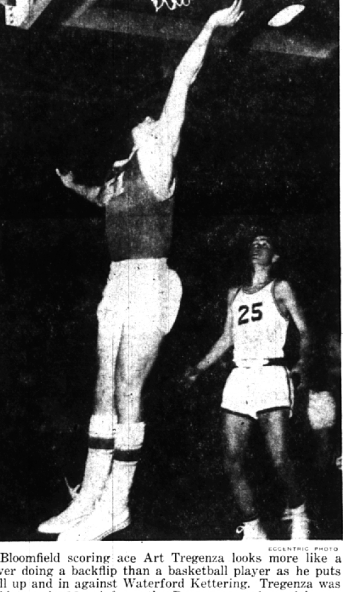
Elene Coucke had the high series for the women with a 654. She also had the high individual game for the girls with a 216.

**Mrs. Smith, Winchell** Pace BAC Bowlers

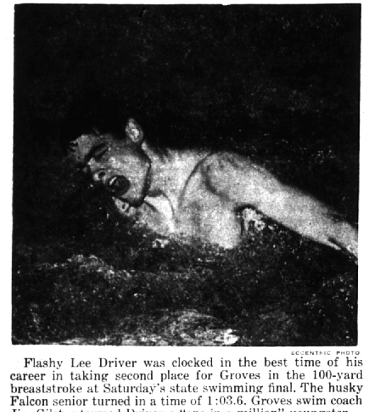
Bette Smith and Frank Winchell took all the individual honors in the Birmingham Athletic Club bowling contest last week.

But Coach Jim Gilster and his tankers aren't the least bit upset about the whole affair. These same students allowed the Falcons to finish in a fourth place tie in the Class A competition.

Gilster explains the situation this way: "our enrollment is just over the 900 and therefore we fall into the Class A category." "The only drawback is we must count as ninth graders in the total enrollment but the policy in Birmingham is not to use them on varsity squads."

The Bloomfield Surf Club, a proposed swimming and recreation club for the residents of Bloomfield Township, is off to a fast start in its membership drive.

Plans call for a June 25 completion date with a minimum 200 families required by April 1 to begin construction. Site of the pool is located on four acres of ground fronting Square Lake Road at the

**THE POOL** will be Olympic size, 25 meters long and 42 feet wide with an additional diving "L" 35 x 40 feet. A spray pool for toddlers is also included.

The bathhouse will be of contemporary architecture, and will have modern checking and sanitary facilities plus a snack bar.

A large, covered patio, ample concrete decking, landscaping, fencing and parking facilities are part of the total cost of \$150,000.

Additional recreational facilities are planned for the future and include a putting green, tennis and shuffleboard courts as well as playground equipment.

Membership is secured in the form of a participation share costing \$35.00. Annual dues will not exceed \$15.00.

serve as vice presidents, and head the finance, membership and engineering committees, respectively.
