The governor will be at the show tomorrow evening between 5 and 7 p.m.

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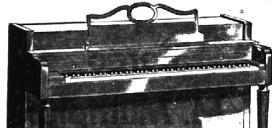

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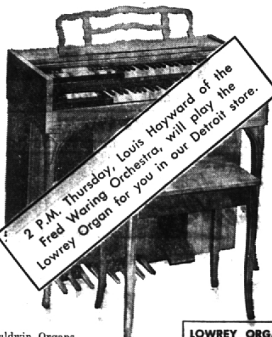

Van Dusen, Elliott Reply On 'Package Deal' Claim

Richard C. Van Dusen and Arthur G. Elliott, Oakland County delegates from the fourth and fifth districts to the Constitutional Convention have lashed out at newspapers for "inaccurate" reporting of the so-called "package deal" at the convention.

The two local representatives were both disturbed at the "wrong concept of what has been going on at the convention."

In response to a letter from a Birmingham resident, Van Dusen and Elliott attempt to explain what they call correct happenings at the convention.

"THE LETTER stated, 'I had thought the fight for a new constitution modeled on the principles established by many thoughtful citizens was in safe hands and would not be compromised.'

"I cannot believe that these concessions were really necessary and I am hopeful that you will reconsider your stand. It is a sad thought that so much dedicated work to achieve a really fine document should all have been in vain."

"He can take a fixed position in favor of an ideal, refuse to accept anything less and explain the failure of the Convention to produce meaningful revision on the ground that he could not compromise his principles."

"Or he can compromise by accepting improvement, short of the ideal, for which he can gather the support of a majority of delegates."

Van Dusen further stated that newspapers "grovel" to the good results of compromise.

ELLIOTT POINTED out in his answer that "any State which has a history of over 100 years will be faced with past practices and procedures, and the advantages and disadvantages of those procedures, when it begins to re-structure its

self through a Constitutional Convention.

"Some things will have a different meaning to the delegates as a result of that history—a meaning which might not exist if you were writing an instrument with no mores with which to deal. Within the Convention, therefore, we find the various opinions being expressed each step of the way."

Facts About Epilepsy

Q. I have heard that epilepsy leads to insanity and again that epileptics are born in the genius class. Which is right?

A. Neither statement is correct. The idea that epilepsy leads to insanity stems from the time when there were no effective ways of controlling epileptic seizures. Epilepsy was then regarded as a completely hopeless condition and sufferers were often placed in mental institutions. While it is true that many great men of history are reported to have had epilepsy (Socrates, Julius Caesar, and Napoleon, to name a few), there is no scientific evidence that epilepsy is related either to mental retardation or to genius.

Q. Can epilepsy be cured?

A. No. However, medical treatment is effective in the control of seizures (fits) in about 60 per cent of cases. A great reduction in the frequency of seizures can be achieved in another 25 per cent. That leaves only 15 per cent of cases which are resistant to control. Considering these figures, the chances for a reasonably normal life for the child are very good.
