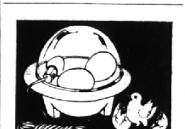
Oakland Receives \$1,673,134 for Highway Purposes

The Michigan State Highway Department has announced that Oakland County and its cities received \$1,673,134 for highway purposes from Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections. Collections included funds from state gasoline and diesel fuel taxes, license plate fees, etc. for the fourth quarter of 1961 which amounted to \$47,517,496. Communities and their shares are as follows: Oakland County \$944,831; Birmingham 37,445; Bloomfield Hills 6,254; Franklin 5,295; Lathrup Village 6,912; Orchard Lake 5,291; Walled Lake 5,876.
