Winners of the Robert C. J. Traub Memorial Scholarship Trust awards were announced last week at Bloomfield Hills High School. Mr. Merrill O. Bates, sons-in-law of the late Robert C. J. Traub, presented a short talk at an all-school assembly concerning the nature of the scholarship. Mr. Eugene Johnson, superintendent of schools, presented the awards. The winner of the art award was Lew Reszka, runner-up was Lynn Schemansky. The music honors went to Barbara Lundy, runner-up was William Hamilton.

The trust was originally set up

by the late Elizabeth Taylor Traub in memory of her husband Robert C. J. Traub (1867-1950) who, throughout his life was deeply involved in art and in music, and who sought in many ways to encourage the cultivation and expression of artistic and musical talents.

The fund was created by an outright gift of 1,000 shares of General Motors stock and is designated to continue in perpetuity. It is intended that each scholarship awarded will provide between seven and nine hundred dollars each year, but this year due to special dividends the sum is in excess of one thousand dollars.

Lew Reszka and Lynn Schemansky, winners of the art award, have both received extensive instruction in art, and both have won art awards. Barbara Lundy and William Hamilton, music winners, have both participated in choir. Barbara is a member of the Hills, and Bill has been in all-league choir for several years.
