**Judge, Columnist Will Highlight Architects Confab**

Nationally syndicated columnist Sidney J. Harris and Judge Bernard Tomson, author of the architectural column, "It's The Law," will be principal speakers at the Michigan Society of Architects 48th annual convention March 27-29 in Detroit.

Presiding at the annual awards banquet Thursday in the Sheraton Cadillac Hotel will be Charles H. MacMahon, Jr., AIA, 3248 Woodside Court, Birmingham, president of the society.  
Described by Time Magazine as "the most quoted newsmen in Chicago," Harris was born in London, England, and raised in this country from the age of 5. His journalistic career began at the old Chicago Herald Examiner where he worked as a copy boy while attending the University of Chicago.

PRESENTLY WITH The Chicago Daily News, Harris has won a number of journalism awards including the first "Page One" Award presented annually by the Chicago Newspaper Guild and the 1957 Friends of Literature "Ferguson Award" for the best column. He is the author of three books: "Strictly Personal," published in 1953, "Majority of One," published

in 1957, and "Last Things First," published in 1961.  
JUDGE BERNARD TOMSON, a native New Yorker, will deliver the convention's keynote address at a noon luncheon March 29.  
Author of the books, "Architectural and Engineering Law" (Reinhold, 1951) and "It's The Law" (Chandler Press, 1960), Judge Tomson, for the past 11 years, has scripted the Progressive Architecture magazine column—"It's The Law"—a layman's language feature dealing with the legal complexities of construction.
