certain ordinances, make changes to meet present day needs, fill any gaps in existing regulations, and reword ordinances held invalid by court decisions. This codification will then be printed as a separate publication and be made available to the citizens at a reasonable cost. "Any future ordinances will be published by being printed in a newspaper circulating within the city of Birmingham and then be filed in the codification."

SINCE THERE will be no competition for city posts in Birmingham, the League of Women Voters announced it would not publish its usual Voters' Guide for the election.

Publication of the guide, containing non-partisan information about voting procedures, candidates and ballot issues, has been a traditional service of the league since the late 1930's.

However, in keeping with its belief that every election is of importance, the league asks all Birmingham registered voters to familiarize themselves with the proposed amendment to the city charter and then vote on it and the candidates.

BIRMINGHAM CITY COMMISSION (TWO-YEAR TERMS)
Carl Ingraham, 48, of 940 Harmon, a Birmingham attorney, and Charles Renfrew, 66, of 987 Arden Lane, vice president of sales for the Jam Handy organization of Detroit. Ingraham, who was mayor 1958-61, has been a commissioner since 1956 and Renfrew, who served as mayor 1954-61, has been a commissioner since 1951.

BIRMINGHAM BALDWIN LIBRARY BOARD (THREE-YEAR TERMS)
Mrs. Carlyn Vogt, 515 Puritan, a Birmingham housewife, and Daniel Nesbitt, 43, of 1645 Derby, deputy superintendent of Birmingham schools. Both have been library board members since 1959.

BLOOMFIELD CITY COMMISSION (TWO-YEAR TERMS)
Mayor James A. Breesford, 60, of 411 Lone Pine Road, vice president of both newspapers, and Henry L. Woolfenden, 85, of 1575 Kensington, a Detroit attorney with the law firm of Dahlberg, Simon, Jays, Woolfenden and Gawne. City elections will be open to 14,027 registered voters in Birmingham and 1,503 registered voters in Bloomfield.

The local (JA) firms will be judged April 9, 10 and 11 and top companies will be entered in competition with other top firms throughout the country in the same industry.

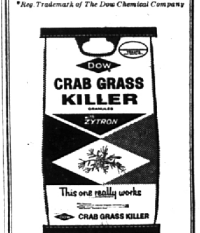
J.A.'s regional competition for the mid-west states will be conducted in Cleveland, Ohio next month.
