

### Missionary Couple Visit Congregational Church

The Rev. C. Robert Avery, director of the Publications Department of the Near East Mission of the United Church Board for World Ministries in Istanbul, Sunday will speak at the 9:30 and 11 a.m. services at the Congregational Church of Birmingham. His sermon will be "Jonah and Protestant Mission." Rev. Avery, a native of Ann Arbor, and his wife, the former Elizabeth Ann Wirth of East Lansing, have served as missionaries in Turkey since 1948.

The Publication Department of the denomination's Near East Mission publishes religious and secular books in Turkish for adults and children. Although there is a high degree of literacy in Turkey, millions of Turkish people have learned to read only in the last decade, according to Rev. Avery. One of the mission's pioneer projects, he said, is the publication of simple books for the newly literate.

The recently enlarged Publication Department now operates a book store in Istanbul carrying English language materials, as well as its other publications in Turkish. Through the efforts of the department, larger staff, its books are sold throughout Turkey. When he entered the University of Michigan in 1937, Rev. Avery expected to follow in his father's footsteps and become an engineer. A serious illness in his sophomore

year, which "gave me time to think," re-directed his life. "I felt that my life had been taken away from me and given back again," he said.

AFTER A YEAR'S study at Boston University School of Theology and three years of teaching at Robert College in Istanbul, he entered Hartford Theological Seminary in Connecticut. At the seminary he met Elizabeth Wirth who was studying there for her master's degree in religious education. They were married in 1947.

Two years later they were appointed career missionaries of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions. (The American Board became a part of the United Church Board for World Ministries in 1961.)

### Maryville Choir Plans Concert at 1st Presbyterian

The Maryville College Choir of Maryville, Tenn., will be at First Presbyterian Church Sunday, April 8, during its 12th annual spring tour.

The choir has traveled more than 28,000 miles in the last 14 years to make appearances in more than 100 cities east of the Mississippi River and has been acclaimed as one of the outstanding college musical groups in the nation.

The group served in 1960 as the official broadcast choir of the Department of Radio and Television of the United Presbyterian Church in the U. S. and has been heard on other national network programs.

THE CHOIR is directed by Dr. Harry E. Harter, Professor of Music at Maryville. He is a graduate of San Jose State College in California, the University of Nebraska, and the School of Sacred Music of Union Theological Seminary in New York City.

The choir is composed of 42 voices chosen from the full 61-voice choir. Members are chosen during rigid auditions each fall at the beginning of the college year.

Dr. Harter has announced a program of choral music selections ranging from the 16th century to the present day and including Negro spirituals and popular choral works.
