Red Cross Preparing For Tornadoes, Floods

With the approaching spring season of tornadoes and floods in the Midwest, Red Cross disaster preparedness is of prime concern in the 84 Red Cross chapters in Michigan.

While tornado disasters occur throughout the year, the next few months are considered the period of greatest danger.

Scott said tornadoes last year killed 15 persons and injured 440 in the nation. They also destroyed or damaged some 10,000 dwellings.

Since tornadoes can strike in any part of Michigan this year, the Red Cross and the Weather Bureau suggest the following preparedness steps as a means of lessening loss of life, personal injury and property damage.

1. THE SAFEST place is a storm cellar, cave or under-ground excavation with an air outlet.

2. In open country—Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead about 25 to 40 miles per hour.

3. In town—Stay off the streets, preferably a steel or otherwise reinforced building, but away from windows.

4. In homes—The southeast corner of the basement usually offers greater safety. Open north

LAWN QUESTIONS (WITH ANSWERS) 1. Is this the time to fertilize the lawn? Yes—the sooner the better. 2. Which fertilizers are best—quick acting or slow acting? Either type is satisfactory. The amount used and number of applications is of more importance. The non-burning type usually costs more and does not appear to be necessary at this time when the grass is practically dormant. 3. What amount should be used? The lawn needs about 6 lbs. of nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft. per year plus some phosphate and potash. 4. Should it be put on all at once? It is better to apply it in 3 applications. 5. How do you figure out how much to apply each time for 3 applications? In 20 lbs. of 10-6-4 there are 2 lbs. of nitrogen. Put this 20 lbs. on 1000 sq. ft. In 10 lbs. of 20-10-5 there are 2 lbs. of nitrogen. Put this on 1000 sq. ft. 6. When should the 3 applications be made? Now, about June 1st, and September 1st. 7. What about crabgrass? Well, what about it? 8. Is it better to kill it before it comes up or after it comes up? Although it may cost a bit more we believe the PRE-EMERGENCE method is both more effective in controlling crabgrass, easier to distribute accurately and less work. (Post-emergence controls almost always require 2 applications.) 9. When should PRE-EMERGENCE controls be applied? After the lawn has been cleaned and fertilized, BUT BY MAY 1st. 10. Will you name some recommended materials?
