

Spring's Here! Grass Fires Plague Area

A rash of minor grass fires in township communities signaled the arrival of spring weather this week. One of the fires spread to a factory building, located at 22455 Telegraph Road in Southfield, causing \$8,000 damage.

Southfield was plagued with 22 grass fires over the weekend. Firemen extinguished eight more Monday and by late afternoon Tuesday had tackled 10 more.

Beverly Hills firemen reported two fires Monday and one Tuesday while the Bloomfield Township fire department was called to four grass fires Tuesday.

None were reported in West Bloomfield though firemen said there were many in areas surrounding the township.

In Southfield, the Advisable Die Works, Inc., 22455 Telegraph, was damaged Monday afternoon when a rubbish fire in the rear yard of the factory ignited grass. The blaze then spread to the west wall of the building.

Library received last year from strained township funds.

TOWNSHIP OFFICIALS stated they felt the additional \$6,000 will be well spent.

"A full time library operation for \$30,000 will give much more return to the people for their money, than a part time operation at \$24,000 did," treasurer Sue Warner stated at a recent township board meeting.

HOWEVER, BOTH township and library board officials caution that the library's financial problem is yet to be solved.

In 1963 there will be no money left over from this year's budget to supplement township funds to the library.

It could be solved if township voters renew special millage which expires within the next 12 months.

A special one-mill tax, voted for three years for erection of the library building, expires at the end of the year. It could be renewed for operation of the library.

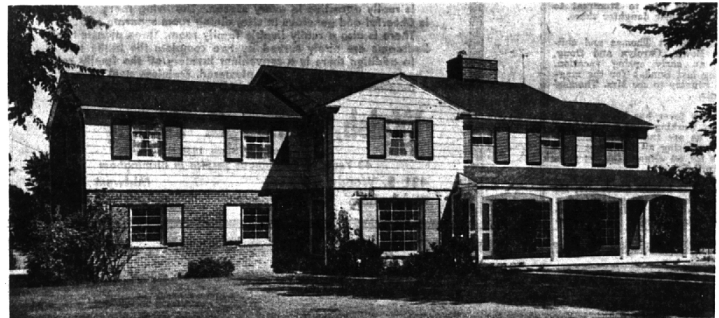

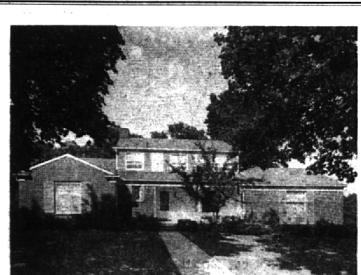

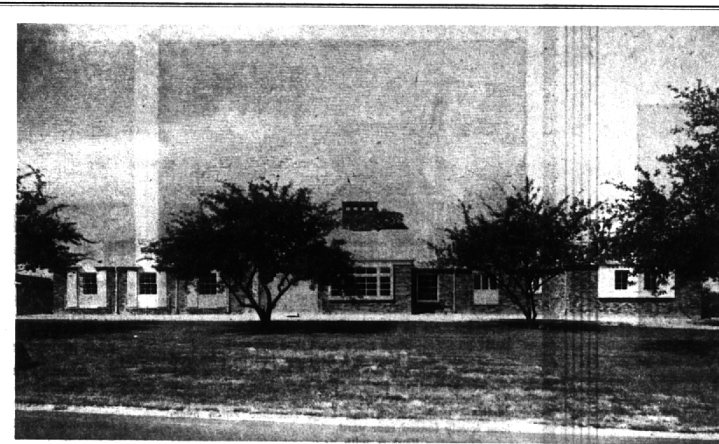
