April Easter Seal Returns Shy \$15,000

Mrs. Elizabeth Kirkby, the Executive Secretary of the Oakland County Society for Crippled Children and Adults, reports that as of April 30 the returns of the Easter Seal Campaign amounted to \$35,137. This is far short of the campaign goal of \$50,000, but it is anticipated and hoped that not all of the contributions have yet been received.

Mr. J. King Ward, Jr., President of the Society is making a special request to those individuals who have not as yet sent in their contributions, to do so as early as possible.

The Society, during the year, receives many requests for orthopedic appliances, furnished to the needy by the Society without charge. Sixty-eight dollars buys a walker; \$75 a child's wheel chair; \$6 a crash helmet; \$150 for an invalid body lift; \$9 to \$22.50 for special shoes; from \$22.50 to \$150 for special braces; and many other such mechanical aids needed for the crippled child.

Support to the campaign makes it possible for the Society to carry on their humanitarian work in the county.

Advance ticket sales in Oakland County for the Jefferson-Jackson Day dinner Saturday are well ahead of last year's, according to Oakland's co-jacket chairman, Martin Boyle of Milford and Al Kramer of Oak Park.

The combined attraction of two major speakers—Wisconsin's Governor Gaylord Nelson and Michigan's John R. Seckman and the congressional candidacy of Neil Staebler have served to fire interest in the event, according to Boyle and Kramer.

THE DEMOCRATS' top-fund raising event will be held at the Light Guard Armory, 4400 E. Eight Mile Rd., Detroit.

The quickened interest is evident throughout the State, reports Dinner Chairman and Deputy Auditor-General William A. Burgett, who predicts there will be approximately 3,000 persons at the dinner, which will highlight a full day of Jefferson-Jackson events.

S'field Man Faces Charge In Hit-Run

SOUTHFIELD—A Southfield man was arrested last week shortly after an accident at 12 Mile Road and Westbrook Parkway.

Earl R. Paterson, 48, of 29415 Southgate, was charged with failure to stop at the scene of an injury and accident and also with drunk driving.

Mrs. Elizabeth Browning, 60, injured in the accident, was released from Northside Grace Hospital April 28. She suffered a broken leg and cuts on the head.

Paterson after the license number of his car was given them by Michael Collier, 23, of Detroit.

Mrs. Browning's husband, Buford, 60, told police that Paterson's car slid sideways hitting the Browning vehicle head-on. After getting out of his car, Paterson fled the scene, Browning said.

Paterson was arraigned April 23 before Municipal Judge Charles Bird Jr. He stood mute on the drunk driving charge and demanded examination on the hit and run charges. Examination date was set for 9 a.m. Friday before Bird.

Airport Group To Await Federal OK

A study of the cost and justification of a major jet airport in Oakland County has been tabled by the special aviation committee of the County Board of Supervisors until the Federal Aviation Agency passes on the proposed site northwest of Pontiac in Orion Township.

The action was taken Wednesday at a special committee meeting. It was in answer to the full Board of Supervisors' request that a preliminary report on costs and demand be made immediately.

THE FAA IS expected to pass on suggested site, within the next few weeks. September is the deadline for a Federal funds request on the project.

Deles Hamlin, chairman of the Board of Supervisors, pointed out that the need of a second major jet airport in the area (already in operation is the Wayne Metropolitan Airport) is still not clear. He further explained that two years have lapsed since the original study, that led to the naming of the new site, and that requirements may have changed with the times.
