Aboard Carrier

Richard A. Brown, radioman third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy H. Brown of Lathrup Village, Mich., is serving aboard the anti-submarine warfare support aircraft carrier USS Intrepid, and is taking part in the first Atlantic Fleet Amphibious Force exercise of the year, to be climaxed with an assault landing on the island of Vieques, Puerto Rico.

YOU ASKED IT!

1. What is the best method and material with which to rid the lawn of dandelions?
Spray the whole infested area with WEED-B-GON McCLELLAN-BALL WEED KILLER or DUPONT WEED KILLER. Use a sprayer with pressure such as a HAYES HOSE Type, or a tank type.

1. What made our grass die in spots?
Probably snow mold or possibly severe snow scald. It will not get worse this year. Scratch the dead, dry a bit of seed (fescue and blue grass mixture), rake it in, pat it down, cover with peat moss, water it and stand aside.

3. Do grubs in the lawn attract moles?
Yes, and some grubs eat grass roots. Distribute CHLORDANE or DIELDRIN over the area in question.

4. Our apples and other fruits were wormy. How can we prevent this in 1962?
Start now (unless trees are in full bloom) to spray once a week if possible (or as often as you can stand of this) with an all-purpose fruit tree spray such as McCLELLAN-BALL'S FRUIT TREE SPRAY or BONIDE'S LIQUID TREE-TOX.

5. Are you out of rose bushes?
NO SIRE! And, what's more, all of our roses are PRE-PLANTED and GROWING—all are pruned and alive! All you do is remove the top and bottom of the carton and drop the whole thing in a hole.

6. Are we too late to apply crabgrass controls this year?
NO. We estimate another week for most materials. However, AGRICOL'S PRE-EMERGE will kill crabgrass up until the plant forms its second leaf. ZYTRON is another excellent material.

7. Do I have to buy a different material for each insect and disease that settles in my yard?
Some particular problems require specific materials for correction. In general, however, a steady, well done spraying or dusting program will prevent or cure the great majority of problems.

For insect control we recommend: ISOTOX GARDEN SPRAY, McCLELLAN-BALL FLOWER INSECT SPRAY, THURON ROSE SPRAY, MALATHION. Most of these are applicable to many different plants.

For fungus diseases we suggest: CAPTAN, PHALTAN, BORDEAUX, SULPHUR.

None of these materials are effective if sloppily applied. Read the instructions—then do what they say.

8. Isn't there something we should be doing for the peonies now?
Yes! They should be fertilized with GARD-N-GRO (4-12-4) or AGRICOL GARDENS (5-10-5), they should be well watered; they should be sprayed with BORDEAUX.
