GEORGE E. LENNOX

RO Democrat
Enters 13th
Cong. Race

The chairman of the Royal Oak Democratic Club, George E. Lennox, has announced his candidacy for Congress in the 13th District, which includes the city of Detroit, at the May 15 primary.

Lennox, 34, and Birmingham attorney, George J. Fulkerson, have both tossed their hats in the ring for the Democratic Congressional nomination. The primary is August 7.

William S. Broomfield, Royal Oak Republican, will seek a fourth term.

Lennox, who is entering his second Congressional race, said he would give full support to President Kennedy.

A Hazel Park High School and Alma College graduate, Lennox is the owner and manager of the Cut-All Tool supply and is a licensed insurance broker.

Library to meet expenses.

The village has taken the library under its roof and shares its office quarters but remains at a discreet distance in its operation and financial struggles.

So, except for the volunteer police department, which spends about \$2,000 of Franklin's budget to keep the roads patrolled at night, train an ambulance and resuscitator in emergencies plus maintain an air-conditioned, the taxpayer isn't paying much for much.

HOW LONG can the "Town That Time Forgot" continue in this unique fashion?

Probably as long as residents prefer to choose to be content with an uncomplicated, grass-roots village structure.

When residents begin demanding special services, when sewers and water supply become imperative, when the occasional lamp-post is replaced by street lights, when full-time police are needed, when professional lawyers, engineers, doctors, teachers, top-executive type talent it no longer willing to contribute uncounted hours to the welfare of their community—then, and only then, will millage be necessary.

The charter provides that 3 mills can be levied if needed. The fragile citizens who manage village funds seem dedicated to the principle that none of it shall be charged if possible.

VOTE MORE money for school? Yes. Keep the roads up? Cars are expensive to replace and a fella's gotta get home. Sewers? Maybe, if it favors the health of the community. But, as refugees from the complex demands of the city the Franklin taxpayer is wary. Here, at home, he enjoys the prerogative of making a "contribution": \$15 for fire protection, \$5 for library, \$10 for recreational opportunities for the kids, hiring a private rubbish collection if the overflow is too great for the "free" monthly pickup and paying his own stretch of road.

Let Construction
On Four Schools

SOUTHFIELD — Englishhardt, Buettner and Holt, Southfield builders, have been awarded the contract for classroom construction at four schools, including Northbrook and Lathrup, according to Assistant Superintendent Albert Howell.

The firm submitted a low bid of \$499,519 and also gave the school board assurance that the work would be near completion by a Sept. 10 opening date. The other two schools affected are Brace and East Southfield.

A week ago the board threw out all previously received bids because none could give a completion date earlier than October. This would have meant the establishment of a half-day schedule which Howell stated, the board wished to avoid if at all possible.
