Heart Attack Is Fatal To Civic Leader

Funeral services for Cleveland F. Nixon, Southfield civic leader and head of the General Motors electro-chemical research staff, were held Monday at the Neely Funeral Home in Detroit.

Mr. Nixon, of 24701 Samolet Trail, Southfield, died Friday at Harper Hospital shortly after he had suffered a heart attack in his home. It was his 61st birthday.

A resident of Southfield since 1957, he had contributed much time and energy to civic affairs. He served as president of the Oakland Village Civic Association in 1958 and 1959 and currently was serving as first vice president.

In his professional career, he was one of the nation's top authorities on electro-plating and related processes. Author of numerous articles in technical publications, he was a past president of the American Electro-Platers Society.

Other affiliations included the American Ordnance Association, the American Society for Treating Materials, the American Society of Metals, the Society of Automotive Engineers and the Boyce Club. A native of Philadelphia, he was graduated from the University of Wisconsin with a B.S. in chemical engineering in 1921. Before coming to Detroit in 1929 to join GM's Ternstedt Division, he was planning engineer with the Western Clock Co., Peru, Ill. He has headed GM's electro-chemistry research since 1952.

In addition to his wife, the former Charlotte Davis, he is survived by four sons: John S., Cleveland W. D., James R., of Blissfield, William D., of New Orleans, and a daughter, Nancy (Mrs. J. M. Riddell). There are 11 grandchildren.
