

First Presbyterian Sets Annual Choir Festival

The seventh Annual Festival of Choirs of First Presbyterian Church will be presented at 4 p.m. Sunday. Five hundred singers, assisted by instrumentalists and organ will combine their talents to once again create an hour of sacred song and pagantry.

The program will include a pre-service organ recital by Marilyn Mitchell, Kenneth Starr and James Himmey, followed by a choral introit, "New Let Every Tongue Adore Thee" by Bach.

Each of the seven choirs will present an anthem and after a festive youth anthem for combined children's choirs the service will close with the singing of "Battle Hymn of the Republic" in which trumpeters Bruce Warrick and John Caldwell will assist the choir.

RECOGNITION of choisters for attendance and loyalty to the music program of the Church will be given.

The service is under the direction of L. Robert Slusser, Minister of Music. Mrs. Mildred G. Ritter, assistant organist, and Phyllis Gardner and Mary Pardee, youth choir directors, will assist Mr. Slusser in the presentation of the service. The Church will have Dr. Joseph J. Copeland as a guest minister on May 13 while Dr. Harris is in Europe.

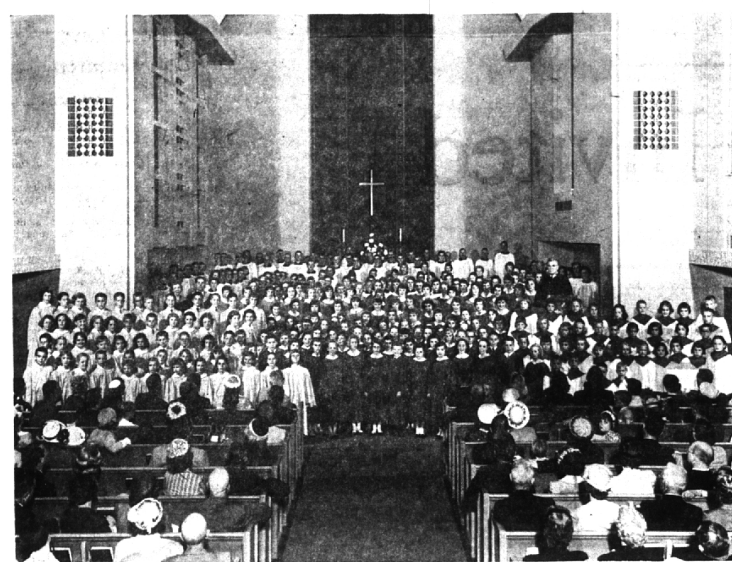

The breakfast is sponsored by four men from the Birmingham area—Peter Blom, Mel Correll, Watson Speedler and John Stewart.

Mr. Blinco will also participate in the Sunday morning worship services at First Methodist Church in Birmingham.

MR. BLINCO is stopping in Birmingham on his way to Chicago where he will assist in the Billy Graham Crusade that opens on May 20. He is a member of the Graham evangelist team.
