Moose Krause Urges Athletic Emphasis

Ed "Moose" Krause, Notre Dame University athletic director, urged Monday night more emphasis on all sports at the junior high, high school and college levels.

Krause was the guest speaker at the first annual all-sports banquet honoring Brother Rice High athletes in the school basketball gym.

MORE THAN 500 fathers and athletes listened as Krause blended his 20-minute speech with jokes about Notre Dame's recent football fortunes and sports at the school levels.

He pointed out that a recent survey on physical fitness comparing 20,000 American and Japanese youths between the ages of 15 and 19 showed the Japanese were

stronger. This fact also showed up on a European comparative basis.

"THERE ARE some parents," Krause said, "that think certain athletics like football are very injurious for their sons. This is false."

Krause put emphasis on the fact that youths between the ages of 14-18 can't find a safer place than the football field between the hours of 4-6 p.m.

"A survey disclosed that 3,075 kids were killed last year between those hours from August to December in automobile accidents. Only one high school football player has been killed in Indiana since 1952."

Cranes, Hills Shine at CMU Relays

Maples Fail to Win Event; Finish Fifth

Cranbrook School retained its track stature among state Class B prep schools, Bloomfield Hills improved its prestige, and Seaholm High slipped three places at the Central Michigan University Relays held last Friday and Saturday at Mount Pleasant.

Coach Ben Snyder's Cranes topped two relay events—the Central Relay and the 440-yard relay—to settle for second place in the Class B field with 43 2/3 points. Cranbrook was runner-up to Ecorse last year, but champions in 1960 and 1959. The new champion was River Rouge with 49 points.

THE SPEEDY combination of Al Wilkinson, Bob Boye, Essel Bailey and Bob Hicks captured two of the 660-yard Central Relay and the 440-yard relay. The Central Relay time was 1:09.6 and the 440 clocking was :45.8. The mile relay team of Larry Hard, Bob Dearth, Bally Grannis and Tom Wilson breezed home in 3:36.5 for the best time this year. However, River Rouge's time smashed the record and Cranbrook ended up second.

The same story was repeated in the 880-yard relay as Boye, Steve Jaffe, Jeff Brewer and Hicks churned the crowd in 1:33.9, but River Rouge was three-tenths of a second faster.

The Cranes got additional points when Wilson, Jack Pulley, Mike Pearce and Jeff Walters finished fourth in the two-mile relay. The foursome of Bailey, Wilson, Brewer and Mike Copeland earned a fifth in the shuttle-hurdle relay.

Wilkinson, of Toronto, Ont., bettered his own school record in the pole vault when he cleared over the crossbar at 11 feet six inches. Earlier this year he set the 11-foot-four-inch mark in a triangular meet against the University of Detroit and Lutheran West. However, his height was only good for a second place tie.

ON THE HEELS of a record-shattering performance in the 880-yard relay, Bloomfield Hills winged its way into sixth place in the Class A division, the first time the Barons have registered points at Mount Pleasant. The Barons totaled 28 points.

Coach Don Hoff was very pleased with the brilliant teamwork of Dave Noyes, John Schweppe, Fritz Stresen-Reuter and Roger Stewart. This quartet erased the 880-yard relay record of 1:31.9 set in 1958 by Flint Northern. The Barons team toured the layout in 1:31.7.

The Barons also won the 440-yard relay as Schweppe, Stewart, Art Tregeant and Stresen-Reuter were clocked in :45.2.

Jack Armstrong, Tom Hoopen-gardner, Bob Smith and Noyes placed fourth in the mile relay with a 3:35.5 time.

In individual events, Schweppe was third in the 100 in :10.55 and Stewart was fifth in :10.6.

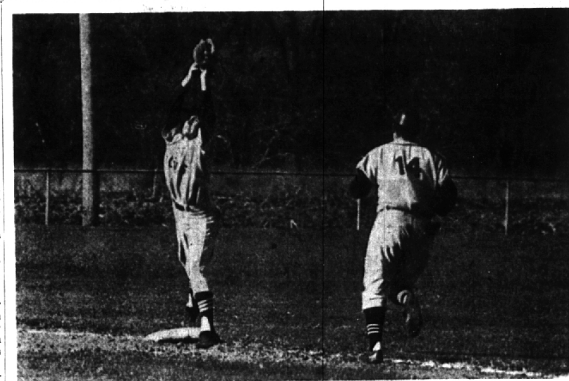
FOR COACH Kermit Ambrose it was disappointing to see his Maples fail to win a single event.
