

Ingraham Asks For Ambulance Service Review

Before advertising for bids for ambulance service this year, the Birmingham City Commission wants a report on last year's service.

Commissioner Carl F. Ingraham asked for the report at Monday night's commission meeting. Ingraham and Commissioner William H. Bursum recalled that considerable discussion ensued last year when the Birmingham Ambulance Co. was cited for violation of the city zoning code.

THE COMPANY was under contract to furnish ambulance service in Birmingham from July 1, 1961, through June 30 of this year. City Manager L. R. Gare pointed out Monday that when bids were accepted last year his office was directed to survey the use of converted station wagons as compared to the custom type ambulances.

Commissioners accepted his recommendation, based on that study, that bidders be allowed to bid on either or both types. They requested Gare to report back on the review of last year's service prior to advertising for bids.

Library Changes Begin; Friends Plan Meeting

WEST BLOOMFIELD — New hours and a change in the charging system were instituted at West Bloomfield Township Public Library Monday.

Officers of the Friends of the Library announced that they are expecting the largest turnout in the group's history at the spring meeting May 25.

The library will be open from 1 to 9 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays and from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturdays. There will be no Friday and Sunday hours.

THE INCREASE in hours results from the change-over to the Wayne County charging system, Margorie Barlow, new head librarian, said.

The two major operation changes are the first since the township library became affiliated with the Wayne County system at the request of the township library board. The latter will continue to control policy matters, however.

About \$20,000 of the township library's budget of \$38,000 was received by the county library system in taking over the administration.

THE DRIVE for new members for Friends of the Library has increased membership by 200 per cent. There are now 90 active participants in the organization which is devoted to support of the township library and sponsorship of cultural programs in the township.

THE DRIVE will continue through the summer.

The meeting will be held at 8 p.m. in the Community Room at the library, 5630 Orchard Lake Road.

A SCROLL-naming the young people in the community who worked during the campaign in 1960 for mileage for the new library building will be presented at the meeting. It will be hung in the library.

Speaker for the evening is Mrs. Helen Williams of Rochester, who lectures and conducts classes on books and authors.

In charge of arrangements are Mrs. John Quinn, chairman; Mrs. Laurence Clark; and Mrs. Richard Jacobs.

Try Parking Experiment At Library

An experiment, designed to solve a parking problem, is underway at Baldwin Public Library.

Chief of Police Ralph W. Mosley reported to city commissioners Monday night on a problem created by deliveries made at the Bates St. entrance to the library.

Congestion has resulted from trucks parking in prohibited areas or double parking while making deliveries.

Due to a relocation of the library receiving room, the off-street unloading area at the west end of the building is now of little value.

INSOFAR AS possible, deliveries will now be scheduled for specific times on specific days. To provide for a temporary "loading zone," library personnel will place a meter bag over a meter in front of the library before a delivery is made and remove it after the delivery is completed.

"In this way," said Mosley, "the space could be used for much needed parking at all other times."

The experiment will be tried for 30 days. If unsatisfactory, the library will be expected to file a request for a permit for a curb loading zone.

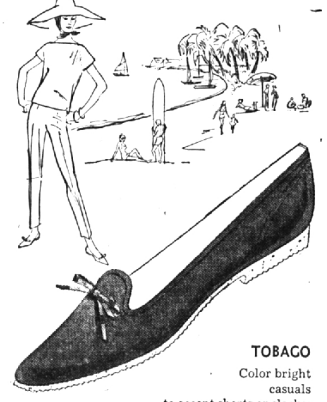
