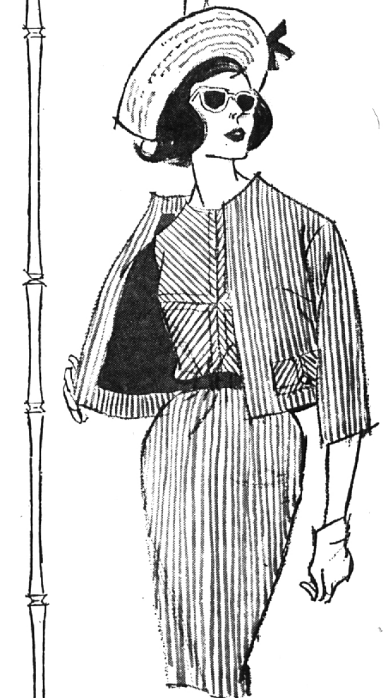

Mrs. Robert T. Hatt will be hostess to nearly 150 guests at the Guild's top social and fund-raising affair between 2 and 6 p.m.

The tea table, decorated with manzanita branches and sprig wild flowers, will be set up in the garden, weather permitting, or in the spacious room which formerly served as the famous sculptor's studio. The Miller house, now residence of Dr. and Mrs. Hatt—he's director of the Institute of Science at Cranbrook—was designed for Miller by Eliel Saarinen. It houses numerous art treasures from around the world, including a pair of Millet's sculptures which stand in the foyer.

Each year the Guild, women's auxiliary to the Urban League, a social service agency supported by the United Fund, provides a \$500 scholarship to a Pontiac student. It has provided nine scholarships and \$4,000. The first Guild scholarship went to Frederick Smith, presently an instrumental instructor in the Pontiac school system.
