meeting preceding the program.

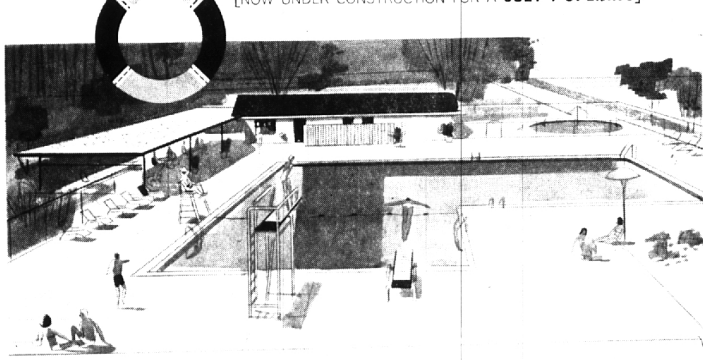
Howe-Pritchard Troth Revealed
