They also supervise the work of the Association's practical nurses and home aides. Home aides are assigned to families of patients who need personal and house keeping services in order to keep the family together. Recently, remuneration for these services has been allowed by insurance companies, provided they fall within prescribed regulations. Services of the Visiting Nurse are available to all and the fees are based on the ability of the patient to pay.
