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## Broomfield Announces Questionnaire Results

Oakland County residents have indicated they want lower tariffs, tax breaks for business, and the "fat" trimmed on non-defense Federal expenditures, according to the results of a questionnaire tabulation announced by Congressman William S. Broomfield (R-Oakland County).

Broomfield pulled his constituents on key issues before Congress "as part of a program to help me find out the views of those I represent in Washington."

THE 14,312 REPLIES were tabulated by an independent firm. Results were:

Tax reform to assist industry, 70.7 percent in favor.

Tariff reduction on a reciprocal basis to spur overseas trade, 75.3 percent.

Cut non-defense spending, 69.0 percent.

Foreign aid with "strings" to insure proper use of Federal funds, 79.6 percent.

Strengthen economies of known friendly nations, 77.4 percent.

Continuation of Food for Peace program to certain communist countries, 51.7 percent.

## Torch Drive Agencies Plan 'Living Fair'

Plans for the "Living Fair," a presentation of the work being done by Torch Drive dollars, were disclosed today by Mrs. H. R. Steadling, 1116 Pembroke, Bloomfield Hills, Oakland County program chairman for the United Foundation Women's Organization.

The six sessions of the fair, to be held mornings, afternoons and evenings, in the Veterans Memorial Building, June 6 and 7, the doors opening at 10 a.m. and closing at 9 p.m. each day, she said, will present to the public the services provided by the 195 Torch Drive agencies for Oakland and Wayne and Macomb counties.

This will be done by exhibits, demonstrations, moving pictures, and programs featuring outstanding authorities in the fields of health, recreation, and social service. Already listed as speakers are Gen. George Kenney, national chairman of the Arthritis and Rheumatism Society; and Dr. Edward D. Greenwood, director of Veterans' Building. Many of these will be actual demonstrations or moving pictures of the work of the agency. Such services as the Michigan Heart Assn., the Cerebral Palsy Society, the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts and many others will provide entertaining action regarding their work. Information on all other Torch Drive agencies will be distributed.

INVITATIONS to the fair are going forward to 80,000 women in the three counties. Of these, 40,000 are members of the UFWO. Mrs. Steadling said, however, that invitations will not be necessary.

## Southfield Man Resigns Post In County GOP

Charles L. Lyle, Oakland County GOP chairman, has announced the resignation of Southfield resident Wilbur G. Durkee, executive secretary to the organization for the past 10 months.

Lyle said that Durkee made his resignation effective June 1, 1962, but that Durkee had asked to serve the party in a voluntary capacity.

In his resignation, Durkee said that his future plans have not been "fully shaped up."

Durkee served as assistant to Jack Gibbs, the former executive secretary, for eight months, prior to Gibbs being named to the Republican State Central Committee.

Durkee served for Citizens of Michigan as field secretary from 1959 to 1961 at which time he joined the county committee.

## Birmingham Man Attending Confab

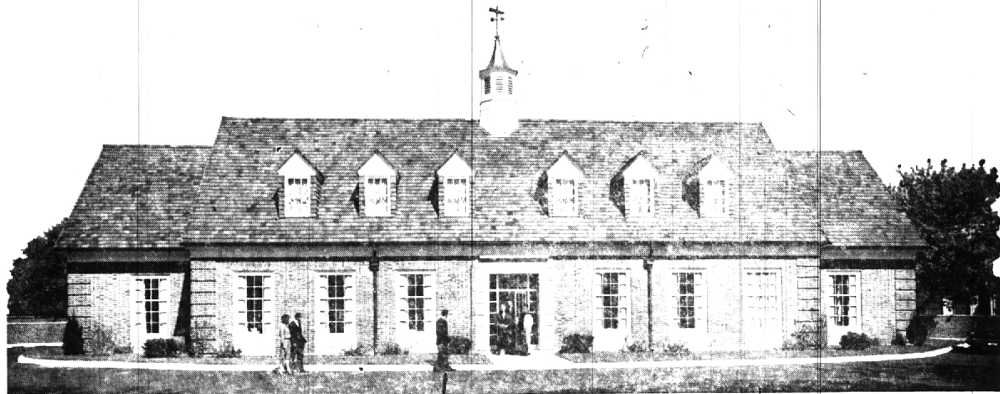
