GOP to Stage GO-Party At Groves High Saturday

A capacity crowd is expected to jam Groves High School Auditorium at 8 p.m. Saturday for a star-studded stage show featuring Tony Martin and the Mills Brothers.

The 2 1/2-hour spectacular, billed as the Second Annual Go-Party by Michigan Republicans, is a fund-raising vehicle by which the party hopes to raise \$500,000 in the state.

FINANCED by local Republican organizations in communities where they are staged, performances of the 1962 Go-Party have already been held in Grand Rapids, Muskegon, Lansing, Flint and Detroit.

"Judging from the size and enthusiasm of the audiences in those three cities, it appears almost certain that this year's Go-Party will be a greater success than last year's, both as entertainment and financially," a party spokesman said.

Other members of the GO-Party

cast include the comedy team of Iowan and Martin, the Weire Brothers, an instrumental comedy team, and The Steiner Brothers, a tap dancing trio.

LAST YEAR, with a different cast that included such stars as Ford on MacLain, Jane Powell, George Murphy and Edgar Bergen, GO-Parties were staged in six cities, attracted 30,000 people and raised \$400,000.

Further evidence that the GO-Party formula for fund-raising is a success is evidenced by the fact that the majority of Michigan cities in which GO-Parties are staged this year have made it their only major money-raising effort. Additionally, said a spokesman, the Republican Party in Indiana has adopted the GO-Party approach as a result of the success here in Michigan.

THE PARADE will originate from Municipal Parking Lot No. 5 and proceed south on Woodward to Merrill. It will swing west to Pierce and then north to Maple.

Traveling west on Maple to Bates, it then moves south to Shain Park. Police said motor traffic in the downtown area will be rerouted during the parade.

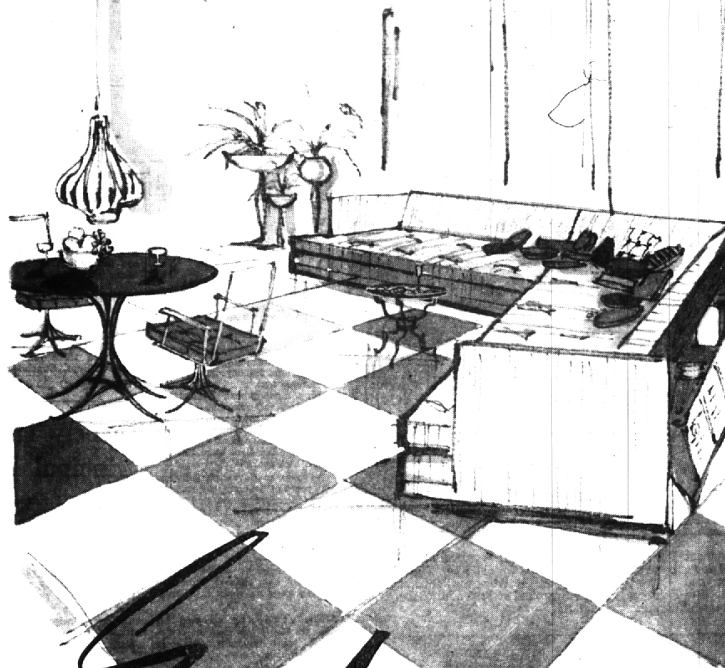

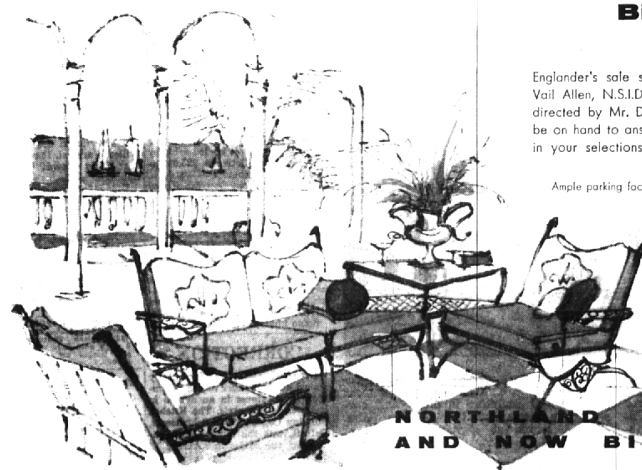

guests of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Daly, accompanied by Cavanaugh and Detroit Police Commissioner George Edwards.

Attendance at the Metropolitan Opera opening at the Masonic Temple, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Cavanaugh.

INTERVIEWED several times during the day by Detroit newsmen, Mrs. Willett expounded her theory of "family living" principles in government.

These she listed as understanding, tolerance and appreciation of each other's problems.

She pointed out that Birmingham long ago took a stand opposing an income tax on non-residents.

Calling Detroit's income tax "taxation without representation," she said it would "create many complex problems and in the end produce more problems than it will solve."

Mrs. Willett emphasized that it would not be proper for Birmingham "to tell Detroit how to operate its city."

At the conclusion of one interview, a newsmen quipped:

"She's an old pro" (meaning that she deftly handled questions).

Mrs. Willett returned to Detroit Tuesday for a 15-minute recording interview with Cavanaugh for WWJ-TV's Municipal Report series on Michigan Week.

She also was a guest at Cavanaugh's "thank-you" luncheon Tuesday at the Veterans Memorial penthouse for the opera committee. Mrs. George Romney, co-chairman, was one of the guests.
