Groves Offers Several New Subjects Next Year

Several new courses will be inaugurated in Groves High's curriculum next year.

Seven new subjects will be offered to students. Two subjects will be dropped and one subject will be added to the required list.

ADVANCED biology and advanced chemistry will be offered next year at the junior and senior level. The student must have a high Chemistry I grade to qualify, and his teacher's permission to take advanced chemistry. A high biology I grade and teacher's permission is also required to elect advanced biology.

Another new course will be offered to those students who think they would like to take engineering in college. The course is drafting (arc-engineering), and is offered to any student in the senior high.

For those students who enjoy the fine arts, a course is offered them next year. It is enjoying the visual arts and is offered also to the senior high student. Also for senior high girls interested in home-making a general home eco-

nomics course is offered.

GENERAL PHYSICS will be dropped from next year's curriculum and senior science will be given in its place. Driver education will also be dropped from the curriculum and will be only offered in the summer session.

Russian I will be offered to senior high students next year, providing the number of students taking the course is sufficient.

Speech will be required of all students in the class of 1966 (eighth grade), and of all students thereafter. Students will have their choice which year they wish to take the course, but they must take and pass it before they can graduate.

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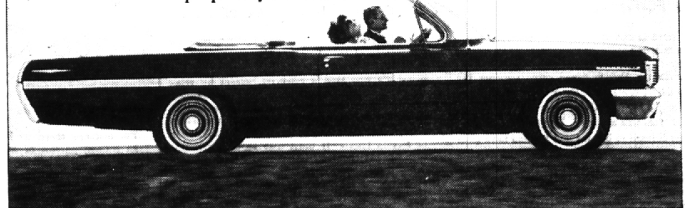
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
