## Con Con Support Pledged LWV

The League of Women Voters of Michigan, with the support of its Birmingham branch, has voted to work for adoption of the new state constitution written by Con Con.

League support was voted at the state council meeting of the organization held in Ypsilanti last week.

The League of Women Voters has been active in the petition campaign that put the call for a Con Con on the ballot last year. Throughout the course of the Constitutional Convention the League testified before Con Con committees and supported measures which would give better legislative apportionment with periodic reapportionment every ten years clearly enforceable. The League also worked for a reduction in the number of state administrative departments, four year terms for governor and

both the house and senate of the legislature with enforceable provisions for reapportioning after every Federal census. Populous Oakland County will receive a second state senator once the constitution is adopted. She also mentioned reduction and consolidation of state administrative departments from 122 to 20, four year terms of office for governor and lieutenant governor, the granting of home rule to counties and provisions for the legislature to establish new forms of government in metropolitan areas if changing conditions prove the need for new forms.

In the field of aviation Michigan has a long illustrious past. In 1923 Brig. Gen. Lester Maitland set the world's air speed record of 244 miles an hour, and in 1927 flew the first non-stop flight from California to Hawaii.
