Cranbrook School's baseball team evened its record at 6-6 for the year last Friday as it lost to Pontiac Central, 7-2, in a non-league game.

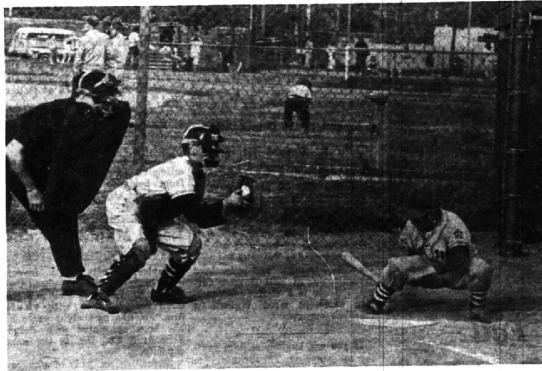
The Cranes mustered only two hits—doubles by Bob Heavner and Gay Bramble.
