ing the American people. Indeed, that is the basic issue confronting the whole cause of HUMAN FREEDOM!

If world-wide freedom depends upon the United States remaining free — then a United States socialistic destination certainly offers little, if any, permanent aid to this subject.

Let me close this discussion with a paragraph I recently printed on the general subject of Democracy. It certainly fits into this subject.

Two hundred years ago a noted historian was writing about the decline and fall of the once-great Athenian Republic (Greece); that Republic fell two thousand years before the historian began his writing. This is what Professor Alexander Fraser Tytle wrote:

"A Democracy cannot exist as a permanent form of government. It can only exist until the voters discover they can vote themselves largess (generous giving; gifts) out of the public treasury. From that moment on the majority always votes for the candidate promising the most benefits from the public treasury, with the result that Democracy always collapses over a loose fiscal policy, always to be followed by a Dictatorship and then a Monarchy."

## B'field Township Adopts Uniform Boating Measure

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP — Joining other Oakland County townships, Bloomfield Township has adopted a uniform boating ordinance controlling motorboat usage and water skiing hours on township lakes.

The action was taken at the township board meeting Monday night.

THE BOARD also agreed on a purchase price of \$32,500 for 10 acres adjoining the township hall. The purchase got voter approval at an election last year.

Other expenditures approved included \$1,500 for air conditioning at township headquarters; \$2,400 for a new patrol car; and \$250, on a matching funds basis with residents of Concord Green Subdivision, for improvement of Eastways Road.

A RESOLUTION rescinding previous Williamsonburg sanitary sewer resolutions was passed. Legal complications following a recent Michigan Supreme Court decision is forcing townships to retract legal steps in setting up sewer assessment districts.

## Winners Named For Mich. Week Product Awards



9. The application of insecticides and fungicides is as important as the materials used. There is splendid expert advice available to meet your needs. HAYES HOSE SPRAYERS, TANK SPRAYERS, SLIDE SPRAYERS. These are efficient, easy to use and inexpensive.

10. Boy, what a berry patch! Be sure to have your QUART BERRY BOXES on hand when the time is.
