Stone Suggests New Building for Storage Of DPW Equipment

LATHRUP—Construction of a temporary building for storage of city DPW equipment was suggested by City Administrator Jerald Stone at Monday's meeting.

Stone said much DPW equipment was being stored at various places in Lathrup and some of it had to be left outside. He said Charles D. Kelly has indicated that the city may have to remove equipment from the small building west of the Kelley Farmhouse near 12 Mile Road.

The building suggested by Stone would be on a city right-of-way on Santa Barbara near 12 Mile Road and could be moved later. Stone will bring plans and cost estimates to the June 11 council meeting and invite nearby residents to attend.

Many Teachers Eligible for Social Security

All teachers eligible for social security benefits may apply for compensation for the summer months, the research division of the Michigan Education Association announced.

Any teacher aged 62 or over who has met the work requirements for social security is advised to contact his local social security office at once to apply for such benefits during June, July and August. However, teachers are not eligible if they earn more than \$100 in wages or render substantial services in self-employment during each of these months, according to the research division.
