

St. James Member Appointed to National Council

Trevor Hall, 1371 Pierce, Birmingham, a member of St. James parish, was recently appointed by the National Council of the Episcopal Church to the "Joint Commission on the Church in Human Affairs". The function of this commission is to stimulate the conscience of the church and focus the attention of the church on specific social issues and to recommend appropriate action.

"The church has a prophetic role in society," explained Hall. "It should be ready to have contemporary answers for contemporary problems."

FOUR BISHOPS, four clergymen and eight laymen comprise the commission. A three-day meeting was held in February at the Virginia Theological Seminary, Alexandria, Va., which Mr. Hall attended. Subjects under discussion at that time were "Scientific Versus the World's Existential Biblical Truths", "Christianity in Space", and "Man's Dilemma in Industrial Revolution". Trevor Hall worked with a committee on the latter subject to study the many phases of this problem—for example automation and cybernetics.

This commission meets, studies, and analyzes these topics over a period of three years, formulating resolutions to be presented to the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal church in St. Louis, Mo., in 1964.
