Local men planning to attend include general chairman James E. Collins of Southfield and Donald L. Byerlein and James Haas of Birmingham.

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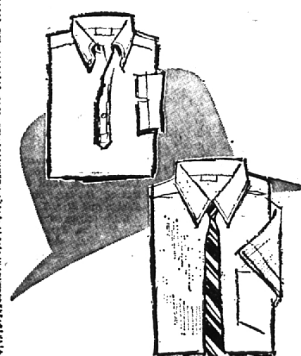
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
